Lloyd George and Northcliffe Foes

London, April 17—(British Wireless Service)—Premier Lloyd George left London this morning on his return to Paris. He was accompanied by the Earl of Curzon and Viscount Milner. Open warfare between Lloyd George and Lord Northcliffe, England's foremost publisher, is to the political world the most interesting result of the premier's flying visit to London from the Paris peace conference, and his speech before parliament Wednesday.

Lord Northcliffe and Baron Beaverbrook, who served as the official eyes-witness for the Canadian government at the front in 1914, and later became chancellor of the duchy of Lancaster and minister of information, between them always have been credited with being the powers behind the scenes which brought about the retirement of Premier Asquith and the succession of Lloyd George to the head of the cabinet.

Northcliffe's newspaper gave Lloyd George general support throughout his management of the war, but when the general election followed the amity they shifted somewhat to the attitude of friendly criticism.

Only during the latest development of the peace conference, have they become sharply critical of Mr. Lloyd George's leadership.

The premier, in his speech in the house of commons credited this fact to the "disease of vanity" and pointedly hinted that it was due to disappointment on Lord Northcliffe's part that he had not been appointed on the peace delegation. The premier referred to the peace terms Lord Northcliffe recommended in the Times before the peace conference began, saying:

"I am prepared to make some allowance when a man is laboring under a keen sense of disappointment. However unjustified and however ridiculous the expectations may be, under those circumstances he always is apt to think the world is badly run." The Times today replied with a slashing attack, accusing Lloyd George of overlooking reports prepared by experts.

"It is openly said by his colleagues in Paris," the Times declares, "that while he is able to read and write he does neither."

After saying that the record of the Times during the war speaks for itself the newspaper apparently threatens a future attack, saying "some points of his war records require to be more fully known."

The Evening News, a Northcliffe publication, today prints a cartoon of the premier hovering over Westminster in airplane, labelled "Hot Air," with bombs for the Northcliffe papers.

Mr. Lloyd George and Northcliffe probably are the two most influential personal forces in British politics and joined in battle the effect upon Mr. Lloyd George's public fortune and the test of the influence of the Northcliffe press which is expected to follow will mark the beginning of a new political chapter, the developments of which are being watched with the liveliest interest. Each man is an eager fighter, and the battle between the little Welsh "Giant" and the newspaper Napoleon is not likely to be a tame one.

CANADIANS SAIL FROM RUSSIA

Vladivostok, April 22—(Canadian Press)—The steamer Montezuma sailed from Vladivostok yesterday for Vancouver with 1,100 Canadian troops on board. An American regimental band played the returning Canadians away. Their passage is expected to be 15 to 18 days.

REV. ROBERT LAING

(Halifax Chronicle, Monday.)

The Rev. Robert Laing, founder and late principal of the Halifax Ladies' College, and one of the leading educationists of the maritime provinces, died very suddenly at his home here on Saturday afternoon. The late Mr. Laing was widely known in Halifax where he had lived for the past forty years. He is survived by his wife, Katherine, a daughter of the late James Croil, of Montreal, two sons, Stuart of the artillery, who is expected to return from overseas in the immediate future, Allan, late of the 10th Siege Battery, now in Chicago, and one daughter, Jessie, in New Hampshire.

The late Robert Laing was born in 1841 in Aberdeenshire, Scotland. He left Scotland in 1847 and settled at Chambly and Buckingham, in the province of Quebec. He was educated at McGill University and later studied the theology in Morrin College, Que., and Edinburgh University, where he received his M. A. degree. He was ordained in 1873 and before coming to Halifax as a Minister of St. Matthew's church was assistant at St. Paul's church, Montreal.

Spending the earlier years of his life in Quebec, he always maintained a deep interest in the people of that province and used frequently to visit his friends among them.


He succeeded the late Rev. Dr. George M. Grant in St. Matthew's pulpit and was followed, on his retirement after twelve years of strenuous work, by Rev. Thomas Fowler.
