

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

BRIEFS-General McCook has been appointed Major-General of the United States army.

HON. Mr. Foster has returned from London, arriving at New York, by the Canada on Saturday last.

MICHAEL J. Kelly, the well-known base ball player, died in Boston, on Thursday last, of pneumonia.

On the occasion of the funeral of the late Rev. Mr. G. H. P. Jones, of the Parish of St. Peter, four bodies were provided with dinner.

Four bodies from the schooner Annie M. Price, wrecked outside Halifax harbor, were found five days ago.

REV. Abbe Brunson, of Nicolet College, has been appointed Coadjutor to Bishop Gravel, of the diocese of Nicolet, P. Q.

MOON anxiety is felt in London for the safety of the training ship Calipso, which was caught in a gale during a voyage to the Canary Islands.

A TERRIBLE fatality occurred at Montreal, on Friday last, when the roof of the new Street Railway offices fell in, killing three men and injuring two others.

The schooner Gaza went ashore two miles above Margaree, N. S., on Wednesday last. After a terrible experience, the crew barely escaped with their lives.

Thirty thousand dollars daily, \$1,000,000 a month, \$12,000,000 a year, are the acknowledged receipts of the Manhattan Elevated Railway Company, New York.

The schooner Annie May, from Parrboro, Boston, was wrecked three miles east of the George Bank, nearly on the point of being lost.

CHARLES Parsons, proprietor of the City Hotel, Fredericton, N. B., was found dead near the furnace of the hotel on Wednesday last. Heart disease was the cause of his death.

ADVICES from Sydney, N. S. W., say an earthquake shook the island of Amey, one of the New Hebrides group, on October 10th, followed by an eruption of a volcano on the island.

It is said, says the Montreal Star, that nearly a century ago, five barrels of oats, found in a packing case, and which were carefully sown and re-sown, by a farmer named George Aiken, at Montague, were the original of the celebrated black oats of P. E. Island.

This Halifax Chronicle says: The schooner Chloris, Capt. McKinnon, when arrived from P. E. Island, met Tuesday's gale 20 miles off Halifax.

On Wednesday, the schooner Chloris was driven ashore by a heavy sea, and the vessel lost her topmast, the boat was carried away from the davits, the masts were torn from their fastenings and other sails split and torn.

A TELEGRAM was received here a few days ago by Mr. P. W. Gibson, stating that the schooner Keesia, from New York for Charlottetown, with 850 barrels of oil for North St. Lawrence, was ashore at Point de Grati, about twenty miles east of Arohaud, and was almost a total wreck.

Regarding the late storm a correspondent of the Pioneer writes: Another cyclone equal in force, if not in extent, to the one of 1892, passed through from West Point in a north-easterly direction to Lot 6, carrying destruction in its path.

The Hamilton Record, it is noted, the new house of Mr. McPherson six feet off its foundation, and levelled trees and fences for about a hundred yards wide to the O'Leary Road, half a mile from the station.

Mr. McDonald was destroyed, and two fine horses and four cows buried in the debris.

With the assistance of kind neighbors, and after four hours hard work in wind and rain, Mr. McDonald rescued these animals, but it is doubtful if the horses will recover, as they were much bruised, having been pressed down to a space of only twenty inches with five tons of hay and a quantity of straw on top of them.

Mr. McDonald's loss will be about \$500, as all his season's crop, farming implements, etc., were partially destroyed.

The storm did considerable damage on the Howland Road, blowing down one barn, unroofing another, besides leveling fences, with other minor casualties.

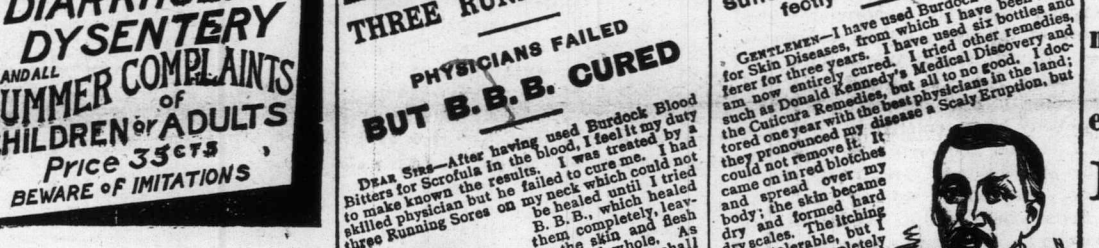
