LOCAL.

THE JASPER AVENUE SUBWAY.

A letter received from F. W. Peters, of the C.P.R., in connection with the preliminary plans of the Jasper Avenue subway, states that the additional cost between the 60 foot and the 100 foot subway will be \$13,450, which the city has agreed to pay. When it was at first agreed to have an 80 foot subway the city agreed on \$5,000 as the amount of additional cost over the 60 foot. The former proportionate cost for the 100 foot structure is due to the heavier steel needed.

A NOVA SCOTIA FLAG.

A unique feature of the decorations of the rink is one of the original flags of Nova Scotia, the famous European banner which denoted proprietorship in what is now the Dominion of Canada. About 1625 James I. granted to Sir William Alexander the northern portion of this continent, under the name of New Scotland, or Nova Scotia. He at the same time instituted an order of aristocracy known as the barons of Nova Scotia. A flag was authorized for their use, consisting of a combination of the Scottish Jack and the Scottish Royal Standard. The flag is white with a blue cross, the emblem of the Royal Standard being displayed in gold in the centre. This flag was the commonly recognized flag of Nova Scotia until quite recently. For some time after Confederation it alone floated over the provincial buildings. The local Maritime Club have adopted it as their emblem. One may be seen tonight over the centre of the stage at the Thistle Rink.

TO ATTEND ANGLICAN SYNOD.

A party of six Anglican clergy left the city Monday for Prince Albert, where they will be attending the provincial synod. The party was made up of Bishop Pinkham, who came north from Calgary, accompanied by Canon Stocker, Bishop of Athabasca diocese, who with one of his clergy, the Rev. Geo. White, has been in the city for several days. Archdeacon Gray and Canon Webb, of the diocese of Athabasca, are also present. The meeting of the synod has special interest for Anglicans in Northern Alberta from the fact that one of the questions to be discussed is the advisability of dividing the diocese into Calgary and Edmonton as centres. While, however, it is certain that this division will eventually be made, it is considered unlikely that it will be sanctioned at this time, owing to financial conditions in the diocese, which, in the opinion of the majority, do not justify the action, resulting as it must in the duplicating of diocesan organizations with the increased expenditure involved.

READY FOR THE BINDER.

A ten acre field of fall wheat on the farm of Godfrey Brothers, three miles east of Edmonton, is ready to cut. The wheat, which is of the red bearded variety, is over five feet high and is headed out to perfection. It promises to yield between 45 and 50 bushels to the acre. A bunch of heads from this field were brought to the Bulletin office this morning and also a bunch of red clover of good growth from the same farm. The wheat will be cut within a few days.

Good Wheat at Lac Ste. Anne.

"We will have a full crop this year around Lac Ste. Anne," said Peter Gunn, M.P.P., a Bulletin reporter this morning. "The wheat and oat crop will be up to that of former years and in my opinion will be somewhat better than the crop last season. "Hay in the district is not quite up to the standard of former years and the yield will be very light, but our vegetable crop is the best ever grown in the Lac Ste. Anne district."

CUTTING HAS COMMENCED.

Cutting has commenced in earnest in the Edmonton district. From several points come reports of grain falling before the mower. Next week the harvest in many quarters will be in full swing. The most favorable expectations are practically certain to be realized in the yield, owing to the extremely favorable weather for filling which has prevailed for the last fortnight or more.

M. Donnelly, a Poplar Lake farmer,

who returned from a trip to Millet on Saturday, brought with him some splendid samples, which are now on display in the window of the Bulletin office. Eye, grown on the farm of Wm. Johnson, 15 miles west of Millet, on the Pigeon Lake trail, measures six feet eight inches in length. Wheat grown on the same farm shows a wonderfully well developed head. "I have been a farmer all my life and I have never seen bigger or better heads than these," said Mr. Donnelly in displaying the sample to the Bulletin on Saturday. On the Johnson farm there are about forty acres of rye, which will give a splendid yield. A field of twenty-five acres of fall wheat should yield forty bushels to the acre in Mr. Donnelly's estimation. Cutting of the grain on these fields will commence on Monday morning. Mr. Donnelly reports that there is any amount of hay to be cut in the vicinity of Hay Lake. Two Calgary men have been offering the Millet farmers twelve dollars a ton for hay in the stack.
