Shipping Arrivals.

Baryta, Gaspe.
The baryta, Gaspe, Capt. Enon, arrived here to James Baird, Ltd., at 8.30 Sunday evening after a run of 39 days, in ballast from Pernambuco. During the first part of the voyage the weather was fairly good, but in making in for this coast during the past 10 days she had very stormy and cold weather with gales from N. and N. E. and a heavy sea. The vessel came through without damage, all the crew are well.

S. S. Carthaginian.
The Allan Line Carthaginian, Capt. Bamber, arrived to Shea & Co. from Liverpool at 11.30 a.m. Sunday after a good run. She left there on Friday, the 22nd December at 11 p.m. and had fine weather all through the voyage with the exception of Friday and Saturday last when a heavy sea with constant snow flurries were the experience. She brought 21 bags and 14 baskets of mail matter with 300 tons cargo and as passengers W. Mark and A. C. Jacobs, saloon, 3 intermediate and 2 steerage.

S. Almeriana.
The S. S. Almeriana arrived here from Halifax yesterday morning after a run of 56 hours during which she had fair weather. The ship brought 1,000 tons cargo but no mails or passengers and sails to-night for Liverpool.

Schooner Olive on Fire

At 6.35 p.m. Saturday an alarm of fire was turned in from box 31, bringing the Western and Central firemen to the wharf of A. Goodridge & Sons, where a blaze was raging in the cabin of the schr. Olive which was laying at the centre pier laden with fish. When the firemen arrived on the premises flames were shooting up the cabin companionway, while Capt. T. Doyle and some employees were trying to quench the fire by drawing buckets of water from the harbor and throwing it down into the cabin. The firemen soon had a stream of water from the plug near the premises on Water Street and in a short while had the fire quenched, but not before the cabin was pretty badly damaged, especially on the starboard side, where a lamp which exploded and caused the blaze was located. About 30 qts. of dry cod were in the cabin, with the same quantity more or less in a locker near, and this was considerably damaged by fire, smoke and water. Capt. Doyle was the only person on board the vessel, and just before leaving to go home to tea he turned down the lamp, which was set in a bracket, and went up the companionway, which he closed almost completely. As he left the vessel he suddenly heard a noise and noticed that a bright light illuminated the apartment. When he went to investigate he found the place in flames, and when Watchman Parrott saw this he notified Mr. Geo. Motty, who sent in the alarm. Besides gutting the cabin in the fire destroyed Capt. Doyle's clothing, charts, nautical instruments and effects, and he loses much by the accident. All on the premises worked hard to save the vessel, which would assuredly have been destroyed but for the prompt arrival of the firemen.

Police Court.

To-day 5 drunks were recorded released, and 6 others were each fined \$1 or 3 days.

A resident of Cabot Street who assaulted another man who lives in the same house and over whose eye Dr. Tait had to insert three stitches in a wound caused by a blow from some instrument, was fined \$20 or 30 days. Angus Orsburg, of Nova Scotia, who was charged a week ago and pleaded guilty to obstructing a train and the conductor on the A. N. D. Co. line and was remanded for 8 days, was up again to-day on the additional charge of assaulting Const. Tucker, who arrested him at Norris' Arm and also threatening to hit the officer with a glass bottle. He also pleaded guilty to this and Judge Knight condemned his conduct in scathing terms. He was fined \$20 or 30 days for each offence, or in all \$60 or 3 months.

Dangerous Proceeding.

Yesterday forenoon as street car No. 7 was going east on Duckworth St., a boy on skates crossed the rails within a yard or so of the tram. Had he slipped the legs would have been cut off him as the motorman could not bring his car up in time to save him.

New Plant.

Mr. J. W. Morris, of the R. N. Co. electrical department, is gone to Canada to buy a new electric plant. It is the intention of the R. N. Co., we hear, to extend the street car service out Waterford Bridge Road around the Lunatic Asylum. In order to do this it has been found necessary to get a new plant. The Petty Harbor plant is now taxed to its full capacity.
