Another Who Could But Would Not.

THE SQUIRES-COAKER NOMINEE FOR ST. JOHN'S EAST.

From this morning's Post, we note that Mr. E. Leo Carter, Barrister and Solicitor, has agreed to be one of the Squires nominees for St. John's East. Friend Leo, it will be remembered, attempted to do the impossible in Harbor Main the last election, and as a result was a sadder but wiser man up to now. We understand that what led him forth from his lair again is the promise of the portfolio of Minister of Militia by the Squires combination, and if this be correct it is the greatest insult that can be offered to the glorious part that Newfoundland played in the great world war. Mr. Carter's family is fairly well fixed with a proportion of this world's goods, and Mr. Carter himself is a very robust young man of thirty summers or so,—constitutionally strong, and it was freely hoped by his friends that he would have been one of the first to join up with his chums, Capt. Jim Donnelly of Caribou fame, and Capt. Gus O'Brien. The months passed by, and eventually years, yet the name of E. Leo Carter never appeared on the list of those volunteering to do their duty by mankind. Neither, we regret to state, was he active or identified in any manner whatsoever with any of the patriotic movements organized to secure comfort for our gallant lads on land and water. On the contrary, like his patriotic (?) leader—Squires—his only work in connection with the war was in taking generous amounts from poor old widows for presenting their exemption claims to the Tribunal—a work, which at the instance of the then Minister of Militia—Hon. John R. Bennett—was being done gratis at a special department in the Militia Building. In view of this he has the arrogant effrontery and temerity to offer himself in a district that has done its duty manfully and well,—both at home and on the bloodstained fields of Flanders and Gallipoli. For colossal gall and impudence, Mr. Carter's nomination is the limit, and St. John's East will throw it back in his face when the votes are counted after polling day when the most popular trio that ever faced the district—Higgins, Vinnicombe and Fox—will come back by an overwhelming majority with drums beating and colors flying. The East End war veterans will handle Mr. Carter without gloves when he presents himself in the district. Of course the office of Minister of Militia can only exist another few months—just sufficiently long enough to finalize the accounts and records of the Naval Reserve and Regiment. Mr. Carter has not had sufficient interest in the doings of the Regiment for the past five years to know that this is so, so we point it out to him for his information and doubtless—regret.

Character.—A flashing Red Acetylene Gas Light, giving 20 flashes per minute, thus:

Light Dark Light Dark
0-3 sec. 2-7 sec. 0-3 sec. 2-7 sec.

Elevation.—Height of Light from high water to focal plane—57 feet.

Structure.—A square wood structure with sloping sides, painted White, Lantern Red.

Remarks.—This Light was put into operation September 17, 1919.

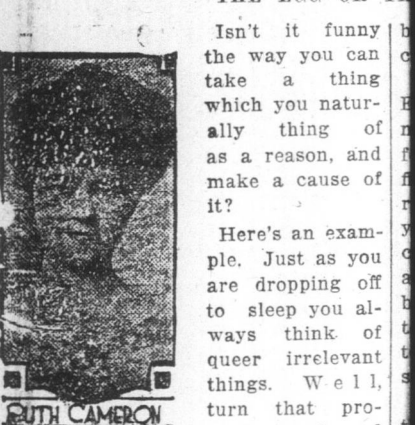
