The discretion vested by the Legislature in the Governor-in-Council is personal and incapable of being delehibition to be proclaimed and of any exception to such prohibition must

The Act imposes no conditions upon able the Governor-in-Council to imcess of the powers granted by the Legislature in that instead of specifying exceptions it proclaims a prohibition subject to certain conditions. These conditions are without statutable authority. As the proclar does not assume to prohibit the exportation of codfish generally and is not directed against any country or place named in the proclamation, its purport must have been to prohibit subject to exceptions and the pro clamation having falled to effectually do this has to be treated as nugatory. The applicant is therefore entitled to export codfish upon complying with

The position taken by the applicants here is that having complied with the conditions called for in the Proclama tion they are entitled to a permit from the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to export this fish.


Preliminary objections have been nade to this application, touching questions of procedure similar to those raised in the case against the Minister of Finance and Customs. These obections are overruled for the same easons as therein stated.

The real objection to this proceed ing is that the applicant's position assumes the validity of the Proclamation, claims to have complied with the proclamation and asks for a permit from the Minister of Marine and Fisheries under its authority.

This Court has already held that said proclamation is ultra vires. The Minister of Marine and Fisheries cannot be commanded by the Court to issue permits to exporters as he has no legal authority to do so. This ap plication must therefore be dismissed St. John's, January 8th, 1920.

PERSIA THREATENED.

LONDON, Jan. 8. The situation in Russia is about as bad as could be from an anti-Bolshevik point of view, according to British war office reports, and there are few signs indicating any likely improvement. There are two especially menacing developments. In the first place General Denekine's army has been cut in two through the Bolshevik push to the sea of Asov at Taganrog, and its flanks have been thrust back, leaving a large gap. In addition comes the claim from the Bolshevik of the capture, further east, of the town of Krasnovodak on the Caspian Sea, and while this is not confirmed Sea, and while this is not connrmed, it is generally accepted as true. 
