

French Politicians Angry With Lloyd George.

United States Asked to Step In-- Bolsheviki and Bandits Overtun Constantinople--Silesian Prob- lem Causing Friction.

BRIAND INTERPELLATED.
PARIS, May 19. The Government of Premier Briand was interpellated in the Chamber of Deputies to-day on its stand with regard to Germany. Three Deputies spoke to-day and still others are down for speeches, which will carry the discussion over until Saturday, when Premier Briand will reply and ask a vote of confidence from the Chamber. The three speakers to-day were Andre Tardieu, socialist; M. Baudry D'Asson, Radical, and M. Marjainne. All of them attacked M. Briand for his failure to occupy the Ruhr region of Germany and to take strong measures for establishing guarantees from Germany. They charged M. Briand with forsaking the French viewpoint on pressure from David Lloyd George, the British Prime Minister. M. Marjainne made a passionate appeal to M. Briand to call upon the United States to aid in solving European problems. He believes, he said, to show how she can assure Europe the peace which she so badly needs.

BRIAND AND SILESIA.
PARIS, May 19. France insists upon the execution of the Versailles Treaty in drawing a frontier line between Germany and Poland in Upper Silesia. Premier Briand declared last night upon receiving newspaper correspondents. He stated the statements he made last Saturday, when answering Mr. Lloyd George's address before the House of Commons, that German troops would not be tolerated by France. "I, too, want to see the treaty carried out," said the Premier to a correspondent of the London Daily Mail. "But there is nothing in the treaty which stipulates that all the rich mining districts in Silesia must go to the Germans, while the poor will get what is left."

L. G. ENDORSED.
LONDON, May 19. Newspapers of this city showed greater unanimity in endorsing Premier Lloyd George's declaration of the British attitude to Poland and Silesia, made yesterday, than they did to his almost sensational statement before the House of Commons last Friday. The Morning Post was alone in dissenting from the Premier's declarations and in an editorial bearing the caption "amazing the Entente," the newspaper declares the Premier's stand to be fantastic and absurd.

ENTENTE CORDIALE AT STAKE.
PARIS, May 19. Declarations made regarding Poland and Silesia by Premier Lloyd George yesterday, caused considerable irritation to the French newspapers. There was little comment, but what there was seems severe. "Perfidious," political editor of the Echo de Paris, said regarding the statement of Mr. Lloyd George, "Please give us even as it possible that you did in the speech before the House of Commons. The affair is too grave henceforth to be treated as politics. There is no way of getting away from this."

CONSTANTINOPLE ENDANGERED.
CONSTANTINOPLE, May 19. Anzietly over the safety of Constantinople is apparently felt by Allied officials here. Operations by bandits are assuming serious proportions. Large numbers of Bolsheviki are arriving and the United States Embassy is under guard of armed soldiers. Turkish Nationalists declare that banditry is being encouraged by

the Greeks who, they allege, are seeking an excuse for the seizure of Constantinople. The country is threatened with famine as the fields are un-tilled, the people being terrorised and afraid to leave the villages.

THE MINERS' STRIKE.
LONDON, May 19. Premier Lloyd George's separate unofficial conversation with coal owners and miners have led to nothing definite so far, and even the names of those who interviewed the Premier have not been divulged. There is no longer even a pretense that the leaders of the miners are unanimous in their insistence that the strike should be equally notable that public opinion remains far from wholeheartedly condemning the miners.

WILL FRANCE OCCUPY RUHR?
PARIS, May 19. The Temps says to-day that conversations have been held, both in London and Paris, with regard to the question put by the British Government as to whether France would occupy the Ruhr region in case the German army entered Upper Silesia. The British Government is endeavouring to secure a meeting of the Allied Supreme Council to decide the Silesian problem, the newspaper states, but the French Government, because of the Parliamentary debate began to-day, cannot make a decision before Monday next. Meanwhile, the Temps adds, the French Government cannot be sure that some event will not arise which will oblige it to occupy the Ruhr, although it is not anticipated here that such an event will occur. If it is desired to re-establish peace in Upper Silesia, the newspaper says, measures must be taken to advise Germany of the risks incurred if the Germans do not put an end to war preparations being carried out.
