It is interesting to note that the Coldstream Guards, who have now returned to pre-war uniform, wear the colour and the badge which were first used in the British Army in the campaign of 1544 in France. Don't Throw Them Away.

Tablecloths past mending can be cut up for traycloths, table napkins, sideboard slips, and these in turn will supply centres for d'oyles. Old bed sheets can be used for dusters, and later, as odd cloths for household purposes. Towels, though worn in the centre, are still good for using as wash cloths and dishcloths, if cut in half and hemmed at the ends. Old linen should be kept for mending purposes, unless too much worn, in that case it can be put up for times of sickness. Woolen combinations, if badly shrunk, can be cut in half, a band inserted at the waist to lengthen them, and when they have served all purposes as garments they have still uses for cleaning-time as rubbers or polishing cloths.
