THE BOK PEACE AWARD.

Some time ago Edward E. Bok offered \$100,000 for the best practicable plan by which the United States might co-operate with the other nations' of the world in an attempt to solve the problem of preventing war. 22,-165 suggestions were forwarded to the Jury appointed to make the selection, and they have tiff consents and asks for motion for awarded the prize to Plan 1469, the name of the writer of which is not disclosed.

The plan is now to be submitted to the American people, and they approve of it or not.
