### Sale of Timber Limits.

On Tuesday the timber berths lying on the north shore of Lake Huron were sold by auction at the Parliament Buildings, Toronto. The timber trade was largely represented, there being present a number of the principal men from all the great centres of activity in that line. The distract comprising these timber limits begins at a point at the north-west angle of Lake Nipissing, and running north for a distance of 30 miles, or over a space allotted to five berths of six miles square; from this it stretches west-ward north of French River to the Georgian Bay, thence along the entire north shore to near the mouth of the St. Mary River. The distance north, from Lake Huron, to a straight line running east and west varies with the indentations in the coast to from forty to fifty miles. This covers all sorts of territory—highly wooded, arable land, tracts of rock, and sections one, heavily wooded, now left bare and gaunt by the fires that have at different periods broken out. There was considerable competition, and the prices were about fifty per cent. higher than the buyers anticipated. The prices were about fifty per cent. higher than the buyers and the locality, those near rivers and the locality, those near rivers and the lake being naturally more coveted than those remote from the shore. They varied from \$50 to \$430 bonus per mile, or, taking the berth to contain 36 miles, the aggregate sum was from \$1,800 to \$15,480 per berth. Seventy two berths were sold, and the amount of bonus realized was two hundred and sixty thousand and fifty nine dollars, a handsome addition to the Provincial Treasury. The ground rent amounts to \$5,086 per annum, besides the royalty on the timber cut. There were about twenty purchasers.
