

Naturalization of Foreigners.
As our readers are aware, Mr. Young, the energetic member for South Waterloo, lately brought before the House of Commons, the question of the naturalization of foreigners, and securing them all the rights of a British subject. This is not the first or second time that Mr. Young has directed the attention of the Government to this important matter, so deeply interesting to so many of our German fellow-subjects; and we trust that Mr. Young may finally succeed in establishing the fact that a foreigner, once naturalized, is entitled to the enjoyment of all rights, privileges and immunities, as much as if he were born a British subject; and can, consequently, claim the protection of the British Government wherever he may be. This is not at present the case. If a foreigner becomes a naturalized subject in Canada, he is not recognized elsewhere as a British subject, and cannot, therefore, claim the protection of the British Government outside the Dominion. This, of course, is a great hardship and grievance, and is keenly felt as such by many of our German population. And to alter this unjust state of things, and place the naturalized foreigner on the same footing with the British born subject, is the object of Mr. Young's resolutions.

In these resolutions he draws attention, first, to the facts we have already alluded to, namely, that persons of alien birth, naturalized in Canada, lose all rights and privileges thereby acquired, when they pass out of the Dominion; and that this, naturally, is regarded as a hardship and grievance by naturalized foreigners, who claim that when once legally naturalized, they should be recognized everywhere as British subjects—provided they do not by any act forfeit such allegiance. He then alludes to the Naturalization Act of 1870, which provides for the recognition and protection by Great Britain of all persons legally naturalized as British subjects in any part of the world, under certain conditions, and directs attention to the fact, that under the provision of this act, a treaty was negotiated in 1871 between Great Britain and the United States, supplemented by a further treaty in 1872. He concludes by petitioning that an humble address, setting forth the aforesaid grievance, be presented to Her Majesty, and praying that she be graciously pleased to take such steps as may be necessary for the redress of the same, by the negotiation of a Naturalization Treaty between Great Britain and the German States, whereby naturalized Germans in Canada may be entitled to all the rights, privileges and protection of British subjects in any part of the world, in as full a measure as if they had been subjects of Great Britain by birth.

A dividend of six per cent. on Dominion stock will be declared at the close of the half year. It has been decided to increase the salaries of Civil Service employees for the Dominion at the rate of 25 per cent. for the third class clerks, 15 per cent. for second class and 10 per cent. for first class. There is also a rumor that a bill is in preparation to raise the salaries of Ministers to \$8,000, and sessional allowance to members of Parliament to \$1,000.

THE LATE SHOOTING AFFAIR IN HAMILTON.
In Monday's issue we gave an item respecting a shooting accident in Hamilton on Good Friday. From yesterday's Hamilton Times we learn that on the day of shooting, the unfortunate while believing that his would not fire, made a statement to his widowed mother to the effect that he, in company with James Rutley son of Mr. George Rutley, of Wellington street, and two other lads, were down at the last shooting, having discharged their pistols several times they went along. Each had a pistol. Rutley, and Rutley had new ones. Rutley at the time of the shooting had discharged his pistol at some object and then asked Rutley to lend him his revolver as he wanted to reload. The latter exclaimed "You're always bothering me, Jimmy," or words to that effect, and then pointed his pistol into Rutley's face. It went off, and the charge struck the poor lad full in the mouth and right cheek, instantly knocking him down. Rutley denied the shooting till yesterday, when, we understand, he admitted having done it, but claimed it was accidental, as he had forgotten that his pistol was loaded.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—Yesterday (Monday) morning, says the St. Catharines Daily News, while a little boy of five years old, named Robeson, was playing in the yard on his grandfather's farm, he fell into a hole about 12 feet deep, and was drowned. Every means were used to restore him to life, but in vain.
