FIGHT WAS A DRAW, BUT McFARLAND HAD BEST OF IT

Some Disappointment in Result of the Welch-Packey Decision.

London, May 30.—Packer McFarland of Chicago and Freddy Welch, the British lightweight champion, fought a twenty round draw tonight before the National Sporting club. The fight was for a purse of \$5,000 and a side bet of \$1,000.

McFarland had much the better of the bout. He led all the way, knocking his opponent against the ropes repeatedly, and forcing the fighting in every round.

The verdict is, therefore, received with much hostility. Welch was the favorite at the opening, 7 to 4.

Kansas City Wants Fight.

Col. Andrew Mulligan, the southern promoter of boxing, is now located in Kansas City. Col. Mulligan is anxious to secure some first class 135-pound man to go to Kansas City and meet Johnny Thompson in a 10 round bout.

The Colonel says that Kansas City is a red-hot fight town and that Thompson is the biggest kind of an attraction. A 135-pound man, with a good reputation would draw an immense house with Thompson in Kansas City, declares Col. Mulligan. Kansas City looks like the right spot for either Jack Goodman or Matty Baldwin who are about the best in that division in the East at the present time.

Henrich Looking for Trouble

New York, May 30.—Jim Henrich, the English bantamweight champion, has left this port for home. Henrich claims the bantamweight championship of England and is returning home at this time chiefly for the purpose of making a hook-up with Digger Stanley, who has been claiming the title.

In discussing the point with me the other day, in support of his claim to the title, Henrich made this statement: "The last legitimate holder of the title," said Henrich, "was Owen Moran, who beat Al Delmont of Boston, some years ago. Moran, however, has outgrown the bantamweight class, and the title, as I view it, has been in abeyance ever since. Digger Stanley, my Kellar and myself have been the English claimants."

Stanley has recently defeated Kellar in twenty rounds, which leaves the question to be decided between Stanley and myself. Stanley has two six round decisions over me, but I fail to see where they have any bearing on the situation, for the reason they took place seven years ago and they were of the two minute round sort which were in vogue in England at that time.

"I also wish to state," said Henrich, "that when Stanley was awarded the decision over me the spectators made it plain that they did not approve of the verdict. I will make an effort to bring a twenty round bout with Stanley as soon as I get home, and if I succeed, you Americans over here will know for certainty who is the bantamweight champion of England."

From J. Johnson's Camp

San Francisco, May 30.—The latest announcement from Jack Johnson's camp is that negotiations for the supervisory services of the veteran Billy Delaney have been concluded, and that he and Al Kauffman will be installed in Johnson's quarters tomorrow or Wednesday. Johnson says that Delaney has agreed to oversee his training along with the job of managing Kauffman, and that from now on until the day of the big fight Delaney will have the say regarding his preparations for his meeting with Jeffries.

Kauffman according to Johnson, will continue training for his coming fight with Langford at Johnson's place and he and the negro champion will aid each other in boxing bouts. Both Delaney and Kauffman are now at Harbin Springs, and are expected to return to San Francisco tomorrow. Johnson is enthusiastic over his success in securing Delaney's services and believes that the veteran's experience will be of value to him.

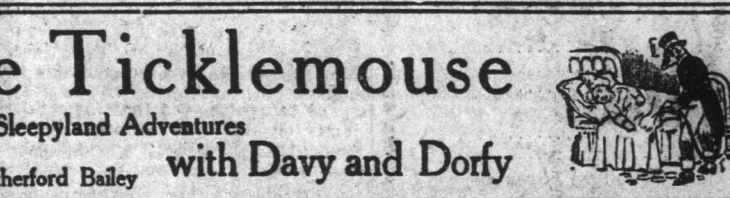
