#### SAVE YOUR HEART.

Don't Crowd Extra Work Upon It, as It Has Enough to Do.

Heart strain may be brought on by many common, thoughtless actions of everyday life, as, for instance, running to catch a train. In an actual experi ment made on a person with a healthy heart before the run the heart rate was seventy-six per minute and the heart was doing 152 foot pounds of work a minute: after the run the heart rate was 180 and the heart was doing 360 foot pounds a minute, an increase of 228 foot pounds. Great strain may also be imposed upon the heart by ascend-

nes.

ing stairs hurriedly. Not only physical exertion, but emo tions, affect the heart. "Keep your temper" is good medical advice, for when a person is angry the work his heart does may be increased as much as seventy-two foot pounds a minute. Even after the emotion or exertion has ceased the heart continues to do ex-tra work for some time before it gets

back to its normal rate. The amount of extra work the heart an do is surprising. Tests have shown that in riding a bicycle at a rapid pace up a 10 per cent grade for half a mile the extra work imposed on the heart would be sufficient to lift one and one-

#### Death of J. T. Lewis, K.C.

OTTAWA, April 13.—John Trav-ers Lewis, K.C., D.C.L., senior part-ner of the law firm of Lewis and Smellie, and one of the foremost law-yers in Canada, died yesterday mornng, after six months' illness. Deceas-ed was born in Brockville in 1857, and was called to the bar in 1882. He had a very brilliant legal career, frequently appearing as counsel be-fore the Imperial Privy Council. He had been chancellor of the Anglican Diocess of Ottawa since 1906, and was also a member of the Canadian Deer Scorted Council of the Canadian Boy Scouts' Council, and of the Exe cuive of the Victorian Order of Nurses. His father was Archbishop of Ontario, and his mother a daugh-ter of the late Hon. Henry Sherwood, of Toronto.

#### More Munitions Needed.

LONDON, April 13.—The Earl of Durham, addressing a recruiting meeting last night, said:

"Three weeks ago, when I visited the British headquarters in France, Sir John French said to me: 'I know that, individually, our men are su-perior to the Germans. I know that when the time comes for us to make our great move, we can break through the Germans, but I know what we want, and must have, and that is more and more munitions. I want to pound the enemy, and go on pounding him, regardless of expense, regardless of the number of shells I use, because by doing so I am saving the lives of our gallant men. The more ammunition, the less danger are our men incurring in making these advances. 'Another distinguished general
