LITTER MATES

A southern sow had eight pigs and could nourish only seven of them at a time. Rather than let the odd pig starve it was given to a little girl, who raised it by hand. She joined the Decatur Country Pig Club as a ham and bacon member, and kept close record of the feed of the pig

cord of the feed given and weights of her pig, which was not a pure bred. When the pig was ten months old, it was killed acording to the instructions sent her. It weighed 225 pounds net when dressed as meat and yielded also a 50-pound can of lard. The pig cost less than five bushels of corn to produce, as it was raised on kitchen waste in addition to the corn.

The other seven pigs raised by the mother and left to rustle with her were killed at the same time and averaged only 87 pounds net when dressed as meat. The instance shows how liberally

the pig will repay proper care and feed by gaining rapidly in weight.

GUNNER CLINTON THOMP SON WAS KILLED AT HIS POST

His Comrade Sends Details of his Death to his sister here.

On Active Service April 30, 1917 My Dear Miss Harriet Thompson: I wish to give you in detail in my rather abrupt way, the last few incidents of a real live soldier.

Tommy and I have been gunners in the same 'sub' ever since we joined

the army. /
We had worked together, ate, slept, fought and dodged many a German shell together, and I must say in all my experience I've never met a bet-Too late for last week.

Being well read, a little older, he

had it over us in world wide exper-ience and was well liked by us all. On Sunday April 29, we were firing under terrible shell fire—the ground in places was fairly heaving— the air hot with pieces of shrapnel. Houses intact were going up in front of our ves, trees blown up—German trenchs, which we had recently captured ere being flattened. At 5.30 in the afternoon, Gunner Keachie of C sub, rolled off his seat at the gun, hit in the head. Tommy, myself and five others were detailed to carry the fallen gunner to the nearest dressing station, which was up the road about a quarter of a mile. I could give you the name of the place we were in and the road, but am sorry the censor will not allow it. I can tell you it was a desperate piece of road at any moment I expected we would be wiped out or completely blown off the road, on either side lay dead horses, broken limbers and bits of wheels along the road. I remarked to Tommy on the seriousness of our comrade's

wound and Tommy remarked "One can never tell who will be next."
