as a witness for her mother, and Chief Fawcett,
learning that she had been in Hagersville,
dispatched P. C. Sissons there Tuesday
night. Sissons, of Hagersville, spent all Tues-
day night and yesterday driving from
place to place looking for the girl, and
found her at last at the residence of her
uncle, Andrew Stewart, twelve miles from
Hagersville. She was brought here last
night. She told the police that her ticket

had been purchased for her by an uncle in
this city, and that she was told if she
only went away that would be the last of
the matter. The trial of Stewart was
postponed until Saturday, at the request of

Easter and Its Traditions.—The month
of April was called Osear month—the month
of the Ost-ent wind (wind from the east).
Easter is therefore the April feast which
is celebrated on the first full moon after the
first Sunday after the first full moon after
the 21st of March. It may fall as late as
the 25th of April. It was formerly a common
belief that the sun danced on Easter Day,
the creation or recreation of spring. The
practice of presenting eggs to our friends at
Easter or pascha eggs are symbolical of
the church choir or Persian, and bears

allusion to the mundane eggs, for which
the consumption of all things. It pre-

also, that the world was created at Easter-
side.
