"Old Glory" At Guantanamo. Stars and Stripes Float From a Spanish Flagstaff. Yankee Bluejackets and Marines Seize a Strong Position, After the Warships Had Silenced the Guns That Defended the Harbor.

Four U. S. Soldiers Killed in a Fight of 13 Hours. Harbor and Base of Supplies Where U. S. Troops Can Be Landed at Will.

Madrid to quell disturbances when the inevitable happens. Reports are again rife that the queen regent wishes to shift the regency to the Infanta Isabella and to let her accept the American conditions.

LONDON, June 13.-The Madrid correspondent of the Standard, telegraphing Sunday, says: General Blanco having again telegraphed that in case the blockade becomes stricter, it will be urgent to send war stores, as his supplies are running short, the government has taken steps to dispatch abundant supplies by fast vessels from Spanish and foreign ports.

The Times, in the course of an article reviewing last week's operations, after remarking that Guantanamo Bay will serve admirably as a coaling station and sheltered harbor for the large American fleet, says: "The Spanish garrison, we think, does not exceed 10,000 men, who have an immense position to hold and are lacking in supplies. Therefore Gen. Serrano's difficulties will be mainly those of climate and movement, owing to the absence of good roads. On the other hand, the difficulties of communication will prevent the dispatch of reinforcements from Havana, and the Santiago garrison will show a good fight before the city is captured."

THE FATE OF SANTIAGO SEALED. London, June 13.-Rear Admiral Sampson's acquisition of a base for coaling and supplies at Guantanamo is universally recognized as practically sealing the fate of Santiago de Cuba, although it is believed that the Spanish troops will show a good fight before the city is captured.

Manila Doomed. "In view of Captain-General Augustin's dispatches, the surrender of Manila appears inevitable within a fortnight. In Spain's interest it is hoped that when Manila and Santiago have fallen she will recognize the necessity of bringing to an end a contest unequal from the first and rendered hopeless so by her total unpreparedness."

Senior Romero Giron, the Spanish minister of the colonies, according to a special dispatch from Madrid, has in the course of a recent interview, expressed the opinion that nothing short of a miracle can save Manila.

THE ROME CORRESPONDENT of the Standard says: Owing to the serious news from the Philippines, the pope ordered the queen regent of Spain, placing his services at her disposal, if she considered the time had arrived for the intervention of the powers in favor of Spain. The queen regent, in reply, telegraphed her thanks, saying that at an opportune moment she would feel the pope's offer to be very precious.

BIG LOAD OF COAL CAPTURED. New York, June 13.-A dispatch from Mole St. Nicholas, Hayti, says: The merchantman captured by the auxiliary cruiser St. Louis, just off Morant Point, Jamaica, last Friday night, was the British steamer Twickenham. On board the Twickenham are 3,200 tons of coal for the Spanish fleet. It has been sent as a prize to Key West.

In the freroom a man in overalls was found, who spoke only Spanish. After a vigorous cross-examination by Capt. Goderich, of the St. Louis, this man admitted that he was a Spanish officer in charge of the cargo. On the approach of the St. Louis he had thrown his papers and commission overboard. He appeared to be badly scared at the way things had turned out. He was sent as a prisoner of war to Key West on board the captured steamer.

HAS MANILA FALLEN? UNCONFIRMED RUMORS SAY IT HAS. Washington, June 13.-Word has been received here that Manila has surrendered, but the officials are still without information as to whether it has surrendered to Admiral Dewey or to the insurgent forces. The cablegram from Ambassador Hay in London gave no particular details. His dispatch read: Advice from Hong Kong state that Manila has surrendered.

LONDON, June 13.-Ambassador Hay says he is not responsible for the statement that Manila has fallen.

A Hopeless Cause. SPAIN'S MOST SANGUINE FRIENDS DISHEARTENED. London, June 13.-The Paris correspondent of the Daily News telegraphing by way of Bayonne says: Gen. Blanco's latest dispatch being less sanguine, the cabinet council discussed whether it would be published, and decided on some verbal alterations. Military precautions have been taken at

A MASTER STROKE. London, June 13.-The Paris correspondent of the Standard says: Critics here regard the occupation of Guantanamo harbor as a master stroke, and the fact that three thousand Spaniards allowed the landing is ominously significant.

A later dispatch from Havana says: Eleven American merchantmen have arrived before Santiago de Cuba. It is believed they are transports conveying troops, which it is intended to disembark. Precautions are being taken to prevent them from effecting a landing.
