A CHARGE OF BIGAMY

James Boyd Arrested in Hamilton and Brought Here-Two Women Claim Him as Their Husband,

Detective Rider went to Hamilton yesterday and brought back from that city, where he had been arrested the previous evening, a laborer named James Boyd, who lived in London until a couple of months ago, when he removed to Hamilton. Boyd's alleged crime is that of bigamy, he having been married in June last to Miss Maggie Tasker, a domestic, by Rev. Dr. Saunders. It now appears that he has a wife and three children who have been living in Chesley, and Mrs. Boyd the first is now in the city, prepared to prosecute the prisoner should he deny the charge against him.

The prisoner is 35 years of age, and originally belonged to Bruce county, where his relatives still reside. While working near the village of Chesley in 1886 he married Priscilla Jane Winch, the 18-year-old daughter of a respectable couple living on the town line between Bentick and Elderslee. The couple lived together until four years ago, when Boyd came to London to bringing one of the children him, and leaving Mrs. Boyd, with the other two children, in a vil-lage near Wiarton. While Eving in e. number of factories.

Mrs. Boyd the first came to the city from Chesley yesterday on hearing of the arrest of her husband, Mrs. Boyd. who is 32 years old, tells a story which does not speak well for the prisoner. Since her marriage, on Sept. 30, 1886, she says, she has had considerable Boyd led her to believe that he owned considerable property, but in less than two months after the marriage Boyd was sued for the price of his wedding suit. Since that time Boyd has lived in many places, and wife No. 1 says that she had to send to her father to take her home, as she was starving. Boyd left her for short periods, during one of which he is alleged to have been living with another wo-man, but in spite of all Mrs. Boyd was willing to forgive him. After he came to London Mrs. Boyd went to the Northwest and worked as a domestic.

The London police knew nothing of the prisoner until one o'clock Wednesday, when they received a letter from wife No. 1, inquiring if he had been married here in June. Bofore seven o'clock that evening they located Boyd in Hamilton, and had him arrested. He does not deny hav-ing married Miss Tasker in June, but he says he did so, believing his first wife had died as the result of an operation performed in the hospital at Winnipeg. He charges Mrs. Boyd with deserting him for another mana charge which the first wife says is absolutely without foundation.

Mrs. Boyd the second came to the city last night. She was an adopted daughter of Mr. John Vair, of Owen Sound. On coming to London to work she met the prisoner, who informed her that he had three children, two of whom he had adopted before his first wife left him. Boyd also told her that wife No. 1 had died in the hospital at Winnipeg, and a month later news came that the first wife was still alive.


