THE SURRENDER AT DEWETS JORP

Painful Impression in Great Britain.

The Press Makes No Attempt to Conceal the Irritation Caused by the Action of the French Deputies.

London, Nov. 30 .- The disaster at Dewetsdorp caused an unpleasant sensation throughout Great Britain. The censorship continues so strict that there is no hope of arriving at a clear conception of the actual position of affairs in South Africa. For instance, independent accounts of the subsequent proceedings and the recapture of Dewetsdomp give ample details, not omitting to announce the capture of two Boer wagons and a quantity of loot; but there is not the slightest mention of the surrender of 400 British troops and two guns, which were not even disabled, inasmuch as the Boers were able to use them against the British relief forces. The "ubiquitous Dewet" seems again to have gotten away, and so far there is no news that the captured British have been liberated.

ADVERSE COMBINATION. Taking into consideration the enigmatheal military situation north of the Orange River, the smouldering rebelfion in Cape Colony, the rumors that France has promised Mr. Kruger to press arbitration on England if he is able to obtain the support of Germany, and that Lord Kitchener after all is not to be given the chief command in South Africa, the British government will meet the new parliament next week at an exceedingly inopportune

FRENCH SYMPATHY WITH KRU-

No attempt is made to conceal the extreme irritation felt at the adoption of a vote of sympthy with Mr. Kruger by the French Chamber of Deputies. The morning papers are unanimous in declaring that no intervention of any kind will be allowed to change British policy.

M'ARTIAL LAW PROPOSED. The Daily Mail publishes an interview with Mr. Zietsman, a Loyalist member of the Cape Assembly, who is now in England, as a delegate of the vigilance committee. Mr. Zietsman admits the gravity of the situation. but says he does not fear a general rising, although he thinks at may be necessary to send thiops into most! disaffected districts, Graef Reinet, Stellenbosch, Worcester and Parri, where mob riots are likely to occur. tie advocates the proclamation of martial law and expresses the opinion that "the only thing which prevents a rising is the tack of arms and ammunition."

DOUBLY UNFORTUNATE. The Morning Post, reviewing situation, says: "The surrender at Dewetsdorp looks still worse in the light of the suggestion that probably half the towns we have garrisoned in the territories of the republic are in no better situations to resist attack." The Standard describes the disaster "depliorable, unaccountable, and, at the present juncture, doubly unfortunate."

A GARRISON RELIEVED. Vryburg, Cape Colony, Nov. 30.-The garrison of Schweizer-Reueke has been relieved by a column of troops sent from here. The beleaguering Boers resisted, but were driven off.

Reception of the Canadians

AT SOUTHAMPTON.

London, Nov. 29.-The weather was wretched and depressing when three companies of Canada's first contingent under Col. Otter landed at Southampton this morning, says a dispatch from that place. As the Hawarden Castle neared the quay side the crowd cheered vociferously. The cheers were redoubled when the Canadians were recognized aft with an officer waving the regimental colors. Volleys of questions were shouted ashore. The contingent looked remarkably fit and well, their general physique being the subject of general comment, though seen side by side with some of the

flower of the British army. The colonel said the behavior of the Canadians had been excellent during the twelve months' campaigning, especially considering that 90 per cent of them had never before been under fire. "The hardest fighting was at Paardeberg. 'Bobs' had given final judgment as to the behavior of the Canadians in

action there." A happy idea, and one which pleased the men greatly, was the presentation of maple leaves, forwarded through Capt. Vaux, by Canadian ladies, to be worn as souvenirs. Among the heaps of telegrams was one reading: "Loving welcome greetings to every Canadian on board, from Canadian mothers and daughters. Well done, Canada." Coll. Otter and the other officers are profuse in expressions of gratification at the warm welcome ex-tended to the Canadians by the people of the mother country.

A CONTINUOUS OVATION.

Another London cable says: Lord Stratheona, Canadian high commissioner, headed a deputation of prominent people that assembled this morning to greet the officers and men of the Royal Canadian Regiment, on their arrival in this city from Southampton, where they landed a few hours before from the Hawarden Castle, fresh from South Africa. The regiment formed in parade order, and marched through the streets to Kensington Barracks, and was tendered ovations all along the route, which was crowded with citizens. At the barracks the colonel read to his men the Duke of Connaught's letter of welcome. Gen. Trotter also heartily welcomed the contingent in a brief but stirring speech. All the officers and men looked exceedingly well. Lieut. -Col. Buchan, Capt. Mason and Lieut. Temple especially. They were all greatly pleased with their reception.

THE HEARTIEST. Still another cable dispatch says: The heartiest welcome awaited the

Canadians this afternoon on reaching Addison road station from Southampton. General Trotter, commanding the home army, headed the group of staff officers and others present, including Lord Onslow, representing the colonial office, and Lord and Lady Strathcona, Col. Lake and Col. Mac-Kinnon, of the City Imperials, and Chaptain Moyd, of the Queen's Own Rifles. As the train entered the station the band of the Scots Guards played the national anthem. crowds outside the station, who had been waiting for several hours, cheered enthusiastically. The cheers were renewed as Col. Otter, Col. Buchan, Capts. Fiset, McDonald, Burstall, Lawless, Mason and Almond, and Lieuts. Swift, Calliwell, Lafferty, Temple, Carpenter and the 280 men alighted. The men were drawn up on the platform, and were inspected by the staff

officers and Lord Strathcoma. Along the crowded streets, and headed by the band of the Scots Guards and the Coldstream Guards, the Canadians marched to Kensington Barracks, meeting with the warmest reception en route. Officer in Charge of German Column in China Is Dead.

Cold Weather in the Far East-Hostile Natives Resort to Sniping.

Berlin, Nov. 20 .- A special dispatch from Pekin to the Tageblatt announces that Col. Yorck, commander of a German column, who was reported to be at the point of death in consequence of inhaling fumes from a stove in his bedroom, died Nov. 27, at Hivaivai. His body will arrive in Pekin today. Field Marshal Count Von Waldersee will bring in Yorck's column.

UNITED STATES TROOPS LEAVE. Tien Tsin, Nov. 28.-The 15th United States Infantry has departed for Tong Ku, where it will embark for Manila. HOSTILE NATIVES.

THE RUSSIANS SUITED. formal reply.

UNITED STATES POLICY. London, Nov. 30.-The Times, dealing editorially with the China problem, says: "It seems superfluous for the United States government to flout its own plentpotentiary where there was not the least probability that he would have any opportunity of signing an agreement. The action of the Wash-Ington administration is chiefly interesting because it was expected that after the presidential election a more definite and a stronger line would be adopted. It may, however, be argued, that the United States only publishes, and does not create, the differences

which undoubtedly exist among the European powers."
