Public Ownership Scores. The information is conveyed by Premier Ross that trains will be running regularly on the new Temiskaming Railway from North Bay to New Liskeard by Oct. 1. The road is completed to the 57th mile from North Bay, and trains are running three times a week over this portion, a stage line thorough accord with British policy. covering the remainder of the trip to New Liskeard. The cost of construction has been about \$25,000 per mile, and the equipment will cost about \$5,000 per mile. This compares very favorably with other railroad systems, the Canada Atlantic costing \$47,000 per mile, the Canadian Southern \$85,510, the Canadian Northern \$37,660, the Grand Trunk \$105,800, the C. P. R. \$52,100, the Intercolonial \$51,000 and the Quebec and Lake St. John \$58,100. The Temiskaming Railway will be of high standard, with 80-pound rails and easy grades. This railway, upon which Russia must depend for the strength of her armies, runs through Manchurian territory for 1,500 miles. While the Manchurians have been quiescent under the Russian occupation of the province, it is believed their sympathies are with Japan because of racial affinity. 
