## ASSIZES OPENED AT COURT HOUSE

Big Grist Set for the Civil List --- A Glance at the Cases To Be Tried.

The famous Moir trial, the feature of the fall assizes, now on before Chancellor Boyd, may not come up until

Mr. Ed. Meredith, K.C., who with Messrs. J. C. Judd, W. R. Meredith and Matthew Wilkins will defend Pte. W. A. Moir, is authority for the statement that an application will be made this afterneon or tomorrow morning for a postponement of the trial.

"It would be unfair to my client and myself to announce at this time the grounds for the application," said Mr. Meredith, "but I consider that under the circumstances, I am entitled to ask and be granted an adjournment. The Case.

The history of the Moir case, while fairly well known, is worth repetition, for never in the history of Canadian eriminology has more interest been evinced in an alleged murder trial than the one at hand.

Pte. William Alexander Moir, the accused, is of Scotch birth, and is less than 30 years of age. Prior to the murder he had been an orderly in the Army Medical Corps at Wolseley Bar-

Color-Sergt. Henry Lloyd, the victim, was a young man, and had for years been a member of the Twentyeighth Battallon, Stratford. He had taken a number of courses in military tactics at Wolseley Barracks, and was tragedy.

On the night of April 17 last Pte. Moir, in company with another soldier from the barracks, came down town, and according to report, drank quite

before midnight on the 17th, Moir was reprimanded by Color-Sergt. Lloyd, then in charge of the guard, for appearing before an officer in a condition unbefitting a soldier.

Later, Orderly-Sergt. Morris heard a shot, apparently coming from the direction of Moir's room in the hospital, and asked Sergt. Lloyd to investigate

#### The Shooting. In company with Sergt. Morris, Sergt

Lloyd went to Moir's room, and it is alleged, saw Moir standing alongside of his bed across the room with a rifle at his shoulder.

Moir is alleged to have said "Throw up your hands!" and then to have fired, point blank at Lloyd. Sergt. Lloyd died a few hours later.

When the shot which killed Sergt. Lloyd was fired, Sergt. Morris, who was unarmed, turned and made his escape. closely followed, so it is alleged, by Moir, who escaped in the darkness, leaving behind him for a distance of perhaps a quarter of a mile a string

At the time of his escape, Moir was heavily armed, carrying with him in addition to a Ross rifle, an army revolver or two, a bandolier belt of ammunition, besides some loose shells in his pockets.

The London detectives were sent out on the trail early the next day on a chase which extended as far north as Goderich and east to Guelph.

The officers, six in number, included Sergt. Gilmour, Wolseley Barracks; Detectives Nickle and Egelton, and Officers Bolton, Green and Downs. The detectives were closely followed by an Advertiser reporter.

### The Chase.

On the day following the shooting traces of Moir were discovered at Kelly's Siding a few miles out of this city on the Stratford branch of the G. T. R. Feeling certain that they were in close pursuit of the accused, the officers followed the railroad to Thorndale, where the rifle carried by Moir in his flight, was found lying near the rail-(Continued on Page Nine.)

SOL GOLDSMITH DEAD.

Prince Ferdinand Casts Aside Turkish Suzerainty and Brings on War Crisis in the Balkans-Conference of Powers Likely To Be Called.

Paris, Oct. 5.—The Temps today publishes a dispatch from Vienna saying that the Bulgarian army is marching towards the frontier, and that the Turks also are moving forward to the encounter.

Austria-Hungary is mobilizing two army corps.

Sofia, Oct. 5. - Bulgaria, a tributary principality under the sovereignty of the Sultan of Turkey, today proclaimed her independence of Turkey. This action was taken at Tirnovo by Prince Ferdinand, who was elected prince of Bulgaria in 1887. The Bulgarian cabinet was present with the prince, having met him yesterday at the frontier and journeyed with him to Tirnovo. The party reached Tirnovo last evening.

Tirnovo is the ancient capital of the Kingdom of Servia. It was here that the ancient kings of Bulgaria were crowned.

Berlin, Oct. 5. - News was received at the foreign office last night that zegovina. Turkey had been informed that Bulgaria was determined to proclaim her independence at Tirnovo today.
