His Excellency Notifies Local Committee That He Will Be Here at Noon, on Tuesday, April 5, When the Floral Fete and "Made-in-London" Exhibition Will Also Be Thrown Open to the Public.

Earl Grey, Governor-General of Canada, will open the Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Byron on Tuesday, April 5, at noon, and at 2 p. m. will open the "Made-in-London" exhibition and floral fete at the Armories.

Last night Mr. H. E. Gates, secretary of the London Health Association, received word from His Excellency that he would open the sanatorium at noon on April 5. Mrs. Adam Beck, chairman of the committee in charge of the "Made-in-London" exhibition, also received word that the Governor-General would open the exhibition at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

His Excellency will arrive in London
