Refused To Give Up.

However, when the case against the company was ordered dismissed. the officials of the department of agriculture refused to turn over the whiskey to the shippers, but took the position that if the whiskey was a blend then it should be labelled a 'blend of whiskey," and could not be shipped across the borders of the United States or any state unless so labelled.

Attorney-General Wickersham then handed down the decision that "Can-adian Club" was the trade name of the particular brand of whiskey in question, and that it could therefore be sold under that name. Following this decision by the attorney-general, Frank H. Watson, United States district attorney, was instructed to ask to have the case dismissed. This acyesterday.

In reality only 100 cases of whiskey were affected by the dismissal of the case. About a year and a half ago District Attorney Watson, acting his own initiative, allowed 8,900 of the cases in question to be released. The Government was paying storage at the rate of \$100 a month, and the action was taken to relieve the expense.



According to Dr. Baker, Thaw is compelled to arise at 5:45 in the morning and is served with breakfast in dining-room adjacent to the ward at 6:15. He has the privilege of a daily bath and a shave.

After breakfast Thaw usually spends from 7 till 11 am, in the patients library discharging his duties as custodian of the books, and for three-quarters of an hour is at liberty to read such newspapers and books as he chooses and attend to his correspondence. 

PRODUCE OF FARMS COULD BE DOUBLED

Address By C. C. James at a Meeting in Washington, D. C.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 15 .- Mr. C. C. James, deputy minister of agriculture for the Province of Ontario, used the following words here tonight in the course of an exceedingly able address on "The Problem of the In-different Farmer":

"In the Province of Ontario we have 175,000 farms, whose annual productions total about \$250,000,000. If by some magic of process of regeneration we could turn all the indifferent farmers into wideawake, progressive, upto-date farmers, the total production would easily be doubled, and it is not beyond the reach of possibility to reble our output."

The address was one of the features of the fifteenth annual meeting of the international Association of Farmers Institute Workers. Canada is well repesented by many prominent workers, ncluding G. A. Putnam, of Toronto, superintendent of Ontario Institutes, who has been president of the Interna-tional Association for the past year; Dr. G. C. Creelman, president of the Ontario Agricultural College: W. J. Black, president of the Manitoba Agricultural College, and several others.






