

A BRAVE BRAKEMAN

Courageous Rescue From Fire by a C. P. R. Train Crew.

Ottawa, May 1.—Fireman A. Lauder, brakeman A. E. Morris and Conductor E. Carroll, of Ottawa, figured in a courageous rescue at Stittsville, a station on the C. P. R. west of Ottawa, last night, saving the lives of four members of a family named Blake, whose house was burned.

The men were members of a freight crew which pulled into Stittsville at about midnight. One of them noticed the flames from the house at some distance from the station, and dashing over, they were just in time to take

out the mother, an invalid, and her three little ones. It was believed that there was another child upstairs and Morris rushed in to get it. One of the walls collapsed and he was badly burned about the hands. There were, however, no other inmates in the house. Morris was brought to Ottawa, and is today in a hospital. He is not seriously injured.

PLAIN TALK TO MANUFACTURERS

Turiff, of Assiniboia, Says West Is Watching Them IN RECIPROCITY FIGHT

Objections Raised in Commons to Cutting Out of Chateaugay Battle in Pageant.

Ottawa, May 1.—The last Liberal word on the reciprocity debate was spoken tonight, and was a significant and memorable one. Amid repeated outbursts of cheering, which kept the Government benches in a state of commotion, Mr. J. G. Turiff, delivered the final message from the west with characteristic western frankness. A few weeks ago the Conservatives were predicting that the member for Assiniboia would follow Hon. Clifford Sifton in opposition to the reciprocity agreement. Tonight they got their answer, when the stalwart westerner spoke the closing word for the Liberal party. It is expected that Mr. Verduin will speak tomorrow for the Liberal cause, and the further continuance of the debate will be relegated to the obstructionists in the opposition ranks. Whether the Prime Minister will be relieved in time to attend the Imperial Conference is accordingly solely the responsibility of the party which delights to flout its liberty.

Mr. Turiff was plain-spoken. He had a warning for the Manufacturers' Association, which he characterized as its own worst enemy. He had a word for the financial interests which allowed selfish considerations to warp their judgment. He had "better be a little careful of the spirit of this great and growing west," he said, "and especially to Sir Edmund Walker," whom he singled out by name, and Liberal cheering.

The men of the west had their eyes upon this eastern capitalist who presumed to teach them loyalty and their own business interests. "They note," said Mr. Turiff, "that Sir Edmund Walker, who has taken money of the farmer and the artisan deposited with his institution, and help to move the southern cotton crop from the States to the States. (Applause.) They see him send their dollars to New York, and Chicago for the benefit of himself and his shareholders, and yet it does not affect his loyalty. But if the farmer, forsooth, sends a steer or a pig or a carload of wheat or barley to the United States to secure a better price, why, he's disrupting the Empire, and what not." Did ever men hear anything so absolutely absurd? (Renewed cheering.)

The member for Assiniboia said he spoke for an agricultural constituency of fifty thousand westerners, who knew what they wanted, and what was best for them without the assistance of eastern self-interest. He recalled that when the Conservative leader visited his constituency in his western tour of 1905 the huge banners displayed over the platform from which he spoke carried the motto, "Reciprocity with the United States." He did not blame Mr. Borden for the motto. It was erected by the Conservatives, who gathered at Western from far and near to do honor to their leader. But it was the one outspoken thing that they wanted, in common with their Liberal brothers, and yet it does not affect his loyalty. ALD. TANCOCK ON ENGINEER'S TRAIL

Made Insinuation of Crooked Work, But Would Not Put It in Writing.

COUNCIL WITH MR. WRIGHT

Eleven Out of Twelve Aldermen Voted to Make Him City Engineer of London at the Pleasure of the Council.

Deputy Engineer George W. Wright was last night named city engineer, on a motion made by Ald. Tancock.

Accidentally, Ald. Tancock endeavored to bring a charge against Mr. Wright, and Mr. Pat Mulhall, foreman of ward 4, charging them with supplying gravel to Mr. Mulhall, for which the city paid.

Mr. Wright emphatically denied the accusation, and denied Ald. Tancock to bring a charge against him. The latter would not prefer a charge, contenting himself with saying that somebody had told him the story. When the council voted Mr. Wright's answer, eleven of them voted immediately to name him city engineer.

When the report of the special committee was read, recommending Mr. Wright, Ald. Tancock spoke up.

"I have heard some things, and I think they should be investigated before we appoint Mr. Wright," said Ald. Tancock. "It is rumored that certain city officials have furnished gravel to certain people for which the city paid."

Workmen were also employed on private jobs for which the city paid. "Place your charge in writing and name your officials," challenged Ald. Saunders. "Come right out with them, so we will know just where we are," said Ald. Tancock. "City council," he said, "I have heard that Mr. Mulhall had gravel delivered to his place for which the city footed the bill."

"There is nothing in this but personal feeling," declared Ald. Mitchell. "Why did you not bring this matter up when the committees were considering the appointment? It is too small and playful for anything."

On the suggestion of several of the aldermen, Mr. Wright was called for, and explained the transaction.

Engineer Explains. "Last year, some gravel was delivered in a lot at the rear of Mr. Mulhall's house, for the east-end sewer houses. This gravel was delivered by the city, for building purposes," explained Mr. Wright. "That gravel was paid for by Mr. Mulhall. He has the receipts to show. I am not sure, but I believe the city has been negligent, and that the receipts were obtained, and the transaction cleared up altogether. You can verify everything by asking Mr. Mulhall. The city did not pay for the gravel."

London, May 1.—Following the ban on the noble skirt by the lord chamberlain, inspired by the Queen, society is eagerly discussing King George's direction that future courts are to be held an hour earlier.

The guests will begin to arrive at half-past eight o'clock instead of at half-past nine. The King and Queen will enter the throne room at half-past nine. Instead of half-past ten, which will permit the courts to be brought to a close at midnight instead of at the small hours. King George is a firm believer in early hours. FIVE SWEEPED TO DEATH WHEN CABLE BREAKS

Perish When Spring Freshened Swamps Boat.

St. John, N. B., May 2.—A special from Edmundton, on the upper part of the St. John river, says that three men and two boys were swept to death in the rushing waters of the river as the result of the breaking of a wire cable which held the scow boat, used as a ferry between the Canadian and American side of the river. The drowned are two Frenchmen named Dufort and Hebert, an unknown man, and two boys named Mashevitz, a Hebrew, and Phillips, son of a former C. P. R. station agent. Both boys were about 15 years.

Owing to the swift current, resulting from the spring freshets, the strain on the cable was greater than ordinary. About 7 o'clock the men and boys, with a man named Dufort, embarked on the American side and were crossing the river, when the cable broke, and the scow, with the five men and boys, was thrown overboard. The men and boys were rescued, but the scow, which was carrying a large quantity of goods, was lost.

A HAMILTON PROBE

Controllers Investigate the East End Sewer Bungle.

Hamilton, May 1.—The controllers today made public their report on the investigation into the East-end sewer bungle.
