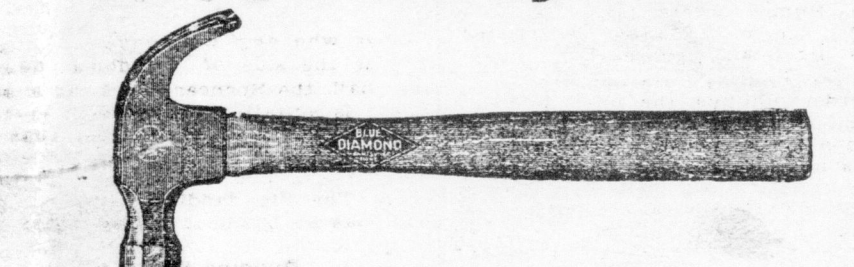

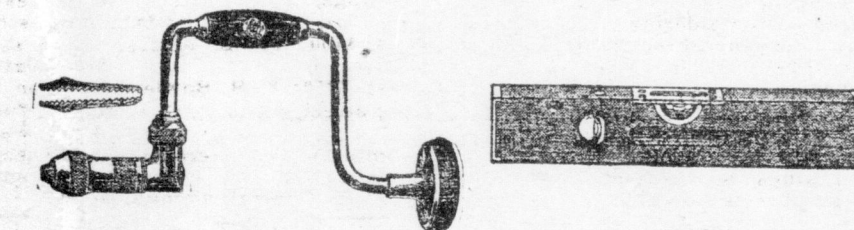

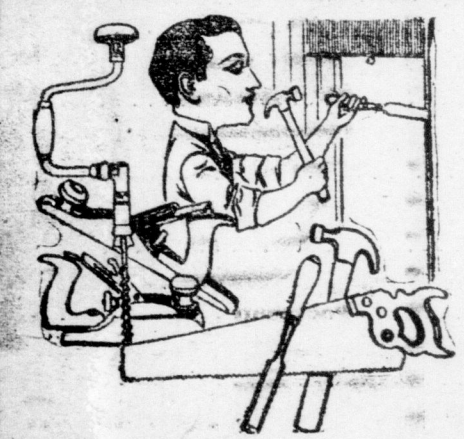

NEW TARIFF IS BEING DEBATED IN THE SENATE

Average Reduction Proposed by Democrats Will Total Almost 28 Per Cent.

Agricultural Interests Deemed of Greatest Importance in Framing Provisions.

Washington, July 18.—An average reduction of 27.6 per cent. under the rates of the existing Payne-Aldrich tariff law is proposed by the Democratic Underwood-Simmons tariff bill upon which the Senate began general debate today, according to the report of the finance committee majority submitted by the chairman, Senator F. M. Simmons.

The report also shows that the bill as reported to the Senate provides rates 4.22 per cent. lower than the Underwood bill as it passed the House, and that from it, together with other Government receipts for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1914, there will be an estimated surplus in the Government treasury of \$2,020,000.

Admitted Free. A salient feature of this bill, it is pointed out, is the large increase of imports to be admitted free of duty. Under the House bill the value of free list imports, on the basis of 1912 importations was \$103,000,000, whereas the Democrats estimate for the year 1914, after sweeping changes, propose to free list imports valued at \$147,367,000, an increase in undutiable imports over the House bill of \$44,367,000.

Upon the basis of ten months for the coming fiscal year, the report estimates that the receipts from customs alone under the new bill will be \$266,730,000; from income tax for ten months, \$38,530,000; corporation tax, \$37,000,000; internal revenue, including tax on cotton futures of \$5,000,000, \$297,000,000, and that the revenue from all other sources will bring the total for the fiscal year to \$796,810,000. With disbursements estimated for the committee by treasury experts at \$994,790,000, a balance is shown in favor of the Government of \$2,020,000.

Are Too Drastic. In analyzing its change in the House administrative features of the bill, the committee "deemed the amendments of the House entirely too drastic," particularly those authorizing examination of books of foreign manufacturers, a five per cent. tariff discount on imports in American ships and other like features, which were stricken out. Particular attention is called to the Senate provision designed to furnish the President with power to impose tariff duties of a retaliatory character upon all articles comprised in a specified list, which includes many agricultural products.

"For some years," says the report in referring to this retaliatory provision, "there has been a development of maximum and minimum tariffs abroad, and in not a few instances the Government of the United States has been compelled to see its citizens subjected to harsh and discriminating tariff treatment abroad without being able under the law to afford relief."

Makes For Equity. "The provision now recommended will, it is believed, place in the hands of the President powers which, though extensive in their sphere, are judiciously circumscribed to permit of their being exerted within the limits assigned them without disturbing the general fiscal system of the United States. Wise use of the retaliatory power will, it is reasonably expected, bring about equitable arrangements with these countries which do not now afford us fair treatment, and it is probable that the weapon thus provided will be so available and effective as to render its actual use entirely unnecessary under any ordinary conditions."

Another important feature added by the Senate committee is a list of one-tenth of one cent a pound on cotton sold through stock exchanges for future delivery.

The changes in all the schedules are dealt with at length in the report. Of agricultural products, many of which were transferred to the free list in addition to those put there by the House, the committee has this to say:

"The House bill and amendments made by the committee on finance fully recognized the paramount interests of our agricultural population by placing agricultural implements of every kind and description, and fence and baling wire, cotton bagging and ties, low priced blankets, boots and shoes, cement, nails, lumber, coal, harness, saddles, cotton gins, wagons, carts, bagging for grain, wool, and other necessary sewing machines and many other products of daily utility on the free list. In common with the rest of our people, our agricultural population will share in the benefit of the reduction of the duties on sugar and its eventual elimination. The substantial reductions made all along the line on cotton and woolen goods, weaving apparel and fabrics, and the reduction of the duties on iron and steel, hardware and similar products of our factories, will remove a considerable part of the burden of tariff taxation."

Free Sugar and Wool. The sugar and wool schedules are left unchanged as to free sugar and free wool, but reductions by the Senate committee in wool tops and yarns are explained, and sweeping reductions in the metal schedules are treated in the report with considerable comment. Pig iron, ferro-manganese and other products were placed on the free list by the committee, and the report says:

"The House bill places iron ore upon the free list mainly because it was the lead of the House. It has sought in the amendments it proposes to the House bill to further extend the free list by establishing a revenue-producing tariff upon the basis of competitive rates, as a just and fair interpretation in the light of existing conditions of the tariff authorities of the party in power upon that subject, and now submits the results of its labors with the confident belief that the enactment into law of the House bill as amended will result in a more equitable distribution of the burdens and incidental benefits of our system of customs taxation; that it will tend to disintegrate the monopolies built up under the present system; that it will enlarge opportunity through individual effort, reduce the cost of living and relieve the people from the burdens of the protective system strikingly exemplified in the so-called Payne-Aldrich bill, which since its passage is intended to supersede."

REINFORCED WALL CONCRETE FACED FOR BREAKWATER

Recommendation of the City Engineer for West London's Protection.

Warns Council Against Delay in Construction of Storm Sewer System.

Comprehensive reports on the West London breakwater and on a storm sewer system for the city were presented to the board of works last night by the City Engineer W. N. Ashplant. Reviewing the breakwater question the engineer stated that in the past fifteen years \$21,178 had been spent on it for piling, planing and general work. None of this work had been of permanent character and he recommended a permanent construction paid for out of debentures, as the safer and better policy. He reviewed the previous reports on various types of construction and recommended a reinforced embankment, faced with concrete, as the most effective form of construction. The estimated cost of this would be \$12.40 per foot, and would provide for a required gravel and earth filling (40,000 yards), the reinforced concrete facing and a pipe rail fence for the protection of the top of the bank. With an additional 10 per cent for contingencies the cost would amount to \$22.13.

New Drainage Demanded. As a semi-preface to his dissertation on storm water sewerage, the engineer pointed out the fact that the new 12-inch sanitary sewer on Dundas street, from Egerton to Quebec, would be inadequate to handle the waste from McCormick's factory or another large industry that might locate there. He recommended the diversion of Carling's Creek at Egerton street and Dundas, and a short, deep cut from there to the river.

The cost, which would be in the neighborhood of \$60,000 to \$70,000, he characterized as a secondary consideration. He also recommended the covering of Carling's Creek, which in the Chipman report on storm sewers is suggested as the main artery of the system, near Richmond street, and also near the mouth branch of the creek at the river. This would make the scheme more practicable. By diverting the creek at Egerton street and running its upper waters to the south branch of the river, the sewer for utilizing Carling's Creek would be made more feasible for the downtown district.

No Change of Plans. No alteration in the Chipman scheme would be necessary in view of the Egerton street sewer, and the cost as outlined in that report would be about the same—\$400,000, according to Engineer Ashplant, who took issue with Engineer Chipman's statement that the Egerton street outlet was unnecessary. Referring to the necessity for accommodating sewage from the eastern section, as well as the storm water, Engineer Ashplant recommended that no action be taken at present on the construction of the Egerton street outlet. His idea was that the sanitary sewer should be laid at the same time as the storm water trunk line to the river.

More Information Required. That the information due the Chipman report is insufficient to justify an immediate start on the storm water system as soon as the funds are available, is one contention of the engineer. He asserted that description, class of construction and similar items were matters for study more exhaustive than the report, and greater than he had the time to devote, so asked that special reports be secured along these lines.

Progressive Ideas Needed. Engineer Ashplant has a rub for previous councils. In part he says: "I have been sufficiently long in the employ of the council to realize that the city is in need of immediate action being taken along progressive lines relative to drainage and good roads particularly. These items must call for the expenditure of hundreds of thousands of dollars. In the absence of more data I must decline to accept responsibility for the construction of piecemeal additions that are and have been crushed through delay."

Construction Indifferent. "Indifferent construction, lack of systematic planning, skilled inspection and care in layout, as well as the construction of private works without the required gradients, has much to do with the present condition. I must warn the council against delay. Thorough engineering is necessary. The system is in serious shape as a result of indifference to construction in past years and the carrying out of abuses contrary to the advice of the council's previous experts. Works which have not the advantage of appearing on the surface as being reproductive, have evidently met with relatively scant consideration, with the result that drainage, which should have been the first consideration of a city, appears in London to have been neglected, and the question of adequate sewage disposal ignored."

WOULD SEPARATE WATER AND ELECTRIC DEPTS.

Water Commission Ask for a Ruling on Matter by the City Council.

Definition of some policy for the proposed separation of the waterworks and electrical departments, now under control of the water commission, or a public utility commission, will be asked from the council by that body. At the meeting of the water commission yesterday, Chairman Philip Pocock reported that the special waterworks investigation committee had no powers to investigate or report on a scheme for the separation of the two public ownership utilities in London. He requested that the commission memorialize the council to provide this power for the committee, placed in the form of a resolution, this suggestion passed the commission.

Housing Employees. The question of providing free houses for employees of the commission at the Springbank pumping station and also at Springbank Park, was again raised. Commissioner J. H. Chapman declared in favor of charging all employees, save the general superintendent, at least a nominal rent for the upkeep of the houses. While the question was temporarily laid over, it seemed to be the sentiment of the commission that Commissioner Chapman's ideas should be carried out.

Commissioner H. A. Stevenson raised the question of the purchase of the Cove island by the water commission. A report on this will be submitted later. Passing of accounts and the usual routine of the commission occupied the remainder of the meeting.

PASTOR DIED SUDDENLY.

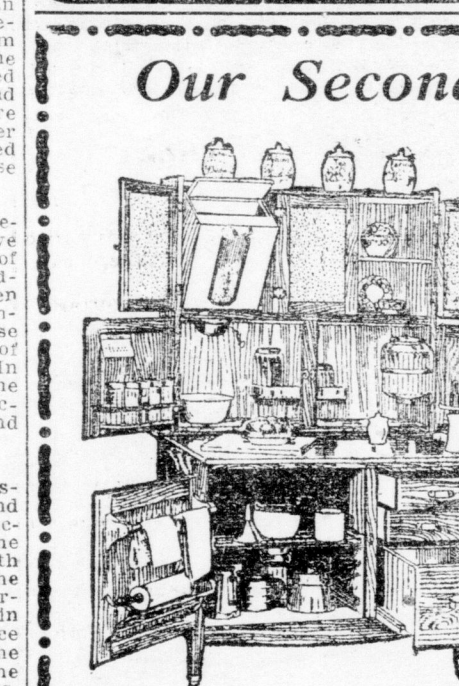
