Wire Entanglements Now "Get the Hook"

London, Dec. 23.—The Daily News publishes the following dispatch from a correspondent in Parls: "I was talking last night with a group of soldiers from the front, and in the course of their stories of life in the trenches one of them told me of an ingenious of them told me of an ingenious device they have for tearing down the German barbed wire entanglements. There are hun-dreds of miles of these barriers in front of the German trenches in France and Belgium. They bring the most impetuous bayone charges to a standstill, until a way is cut through them. Now, I am told, the French are experimenting with an apparatus which throws a grappling iron attached to a rope over en-tanglements, which are then dragged down and hauled into

"By posting a few good marksmen under cover to command the spot where it is intended to hurl the grappler, the French secure a number of victims, besides destroying the barriers. Instinctively several Germans will dash out of their trenches to try to secure the grappler beit is hauled taut and catch in the wires, and these are almost invariably shot down.'
