## ALLIED AIRMEN BOMB BRUSSELS THROUGH NIGHT

Continue Attacks From One in the Morning Until Daybreak.

### FLY AT CLOSE RANGE

People Wonderfully Heartened When Entente Planes Make Appearance.

THE HAGUE, Netherlands, Sept. 7.—Via London, 3 p.m.—Brussels was bombed by a squadron of fifteen aeroplanes Wednesday, according to an eye-witness of the raid, who has arrived here.

To the Associated Press he said he was sitting with friends in a hotel in the centre of the city when the squadron appeared over the city. Anti-aircraft guns immediately went into action. It was then 1 o'clock in the morning, he said, and some time previously soldiers had issued warnings for the extinguishing of all lights. The aeroplanes were seen distinctly, he declared, and some flew so low that they seemed to touch the roof of the hotel, but their nationality was not made out. Guests in the upper rooms of the hotel fled hurriedly downstairs.

Explosions Continue All Night. Intermittent bomb explosions and firing continued until daybreak. One machine, he added, was reported to have been brought down at Porte Louise, on the outskirts of the city. He said the damage done had not been ascertained when he left Brussels.

"This was the most important raid in a long while," he said. "Smaller affairs occur almost every other day. These frequent air visits by Entente aeroplanes hearten the Belgian people wonderfully, and inevitably lead to exaggerated notions of the impending departure of the Germans."

This is the first report of an air raid on Brussels Wednesday. A British official statement issued on September 4 reported that on the two preceding days British aeroplanes had made a raid of Hottelken, near Antwerp, and on a town near Bruges.

## LT.-COL. C. N. SHANLY, CHIEF PAYMASTER, IS DEAD FROM OVERWORK

Health Broke Down in France After Months of Strain.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, Sept. 7.—Lieut.-Col. C. N. Shanly, D.S.O., chief paymaster of the Canadian army in France, died here today from the effects of overwork at the front. He was invalided home a short time ago after being on active service since the outbreak of war. He left Canada with the first contingent and was made a member of the distinguished service order for his excellent services in the reorganization of the Canadian pay and record office in London, England, and his work in connection with the amalgamation of the Imperial and Canadian pay departments in France.

He was a comparatively young man and was the last surviving son of the late Francis Shanly, well-known railway engineer, and former city engineer of Toronto.

On the organization of the first Canadian division, Colonel (then Major) Shanly was appointed chief field paymaster for overseas service, and served in that capacity at Valenciennes, Salisbury Plains, and in France, with headquarters at Rouen, where his health broke down, and after several months in hospital he returned to Canada, July 21.

## WIFE OF DEAD AUTHOR MAY HAVE ENDED LIFE

Mrs. A. E. Victor Missing — Canoe Found in Lake.

TORONTO, Sept. 7.—There is little doubt that Mrs. A. E. Victor, who disappeared from her home at Port Credit after her husband, the author, had been killed by the C. P. R. New York train near the Port Credit station on Wednesday morning, committed suicide. It is believed the drowned woman was adrift on her canoe. The canoe has been found.

It is known she had expressed a wish to die, and this statement made after the death of her husband, taken with the circumstances of the finding of the canoe, has convinced the authorities that the woman ended her life.

## ENGLAND AND SWEDEN HAVE WAR TRADE PACT

[Canadian Press.] Stockholm, Via London, Sept. 8.—Sweden and England, according to reports, have entered into an agreement regarding Swiss importation of salt herring, by which 150,000 barrels of herring taken in South Iceland waters for Sweden will be granted free passage, as also will 150,000 barrels additional to be imported by way of Norway. Large quantities of hides, coffee and maize, which have been held up for a long time in Sweden, will now be released for England.

## MINISTER OF FINANCE ASKS GREATER ECONOMY

Says Canada Must Be Prepared to Pay for Munitions.

OTTAWA, Sept. 7.—The minister of finance foreshadows a thrift campaign to promote greater national saving. He said he was sure that the government would find the money for munitions and supplies purchased here, just as the United States finds the money for orders placed there, there being the closest possible connection between the ability to finance, and the getting of international orders.

Detention of the new war loan will be announced next week.

## FUNERAL OF ALEX. MCINTYRE

INGERSOLL, Sept. 7.—The funeral of Alexander McIntyre, whose death occurred suddenly in West Oxford on Monday, was the largest seen here in years. The funeral was held from the family residence to the Ingersoll Rural Cemetery, services being conducted by Rev. Ronald MacLeod, chaplain of the 15th Battalion.

## Queen of Holland Enjoys a Plunge in a Submarine

AMSTERDAM, via London, Sept. 7.—9:12 p.m.—Queen Wilhelmina of Holland has enjoyed the experience of a plunge under water in a submarine. The queen was present at the naval manoeuvres yesterday, according to the Nieuws Van Den Dag, aboard a submarine, which dived twice while her majesty was a passenger.

## SLAYS WIFE, TOLLS CHURCH BELL, GIVES UP TO THE POLICE

Eastern Ontario Farmer Says Deed Was Premeditated.

OTTAWA, Sept. 7.—Alphonse Barre, a prosperous farmer living at Rose Corners, a few miles east of Casselman, this morning, shot his wife as she lay in bed, then leaving his three small daughters to find their mother's body, walked two miles to the village of St. Isidore, tolled a death knell on the bell of the Roman Catholic church, and surrendered himself to the police. It is said there has been trouble in the family for more than 25 years.

The shooting was committed about 5 o'clock. Barre had concealed his revolver under his pillow, in preparation for a quarrel with his wife in the morning. He has admitted the deed was premeditated, and maintains he is glad it is over.

## BRITISH FLAG FLIES OVER 3 PORTS NOW IN GERMAN E. AFRICA

Last of Enemy's Colonies Being Hemmed In by Sea and Land.

LONDON, Sept. 7.—9:55 p.m.—The ports of Kilwa Kivinye and Kilwa Kisiwani, in German East Africa, respectively 150 and 175 miles south of Dar-es-Salaam, have surrendered to the British under threat of a bombardment, according to an official statement issued tonight, giving details of the recent surrender of Dar-es-Salaam. The statement says:

"At dawn on the 3rd of September a naval attack by British forces in which, in conjunction with a heavy bombardment of enemy positions north of the town from the direction of Bagamoyo, was followed by landings at Kunduchi and in Masahani Bay. The enemy evacuated Dar-es-Salaam, which was occupied by combined naval and military forces, the British colours being hoisted with full honours. The town, except for the portions occupied by the German troops, was virtually undamaged."

"On the 7th British naval forces and marines with local landing parties occupied the ports of Kilwa Kivinye and Kilwa Kisiwani, which surrendered under threat of a naval bombardment."

## RUSSIANS CAPTURE MORE THAN 5,000 PRISONERS

Halicz Bombard and Railway Line Captured From Teutons.

PETROGRAD, via London, Sept. 7.—The Russians are bombarding the Galician town of Halicz, about sixty miles southeast of Lemberg, says the Russian official report issued today. The town is in flames. The Russian statement adds that Russian troops have acquired the railway lines between Halicz and Semikovitze and Wodniki.

In the fighting in Eastern Galicia yesterday, the announcement says, the Russians took 5,000 more prisoners.

## MONUMENT TO MARK FINISH OF ZEPPELIN

[Canadian Press.] London, Sept. 8.—The site on the hillside at Cuttles where Lieut. William Leefe Robinson of the Royal Flying Corps brought down a zeppelin during the German air raid on the east coast of England Saturday night, has been offered to the nation by its owner, Mrs. Kidston. The gift is made with the understanding that by public subscription on the spot where the zeppelin fell.

## IS NOT ABANDONING MAIL ROUTES IN U. S.

Government Makes Official Denial of Reports.

OTTAWA, Sept. 7.—Official denial is given here to rumors originating in New York, Washington and Winnipeg, that the Government intends to abandon use of American ports in handling mails, and that no contracts are to be made with United States railways.

The rumors are regarded as circulated for political purposes across the line.

## HEAVY RAINSTORM IN INGERSOLL DISTRICT

[Special to The Advertiser.] INGERSOLL, Sept. 7.—The showers, for which sweltering humanity has been longing, arrived shortly after 4 o'clock this afternoon. They were heavy, and were accompanied by much thunder and lightning.

For a time the rain came down in torrents. The rain was badly needed, and a very beneficial result is anticipated.

## ITALIANS IN ALBANIA.

ROME, via London, Sept. 7.—The Italian forces in Albania, which recently have been advancing inland from Avlona, are not engaged in heavy fighting, so far as indicated today in the official statement on operations on this front. In Albania yesterday, "the statement says, "our batteries dispersed some enemy detachments near Hamhuri, on the right bank of the Yoyu."
