

AID EXHIBITION

British Mission Seeks Cooperation of Traders in Dominion.

Gordon Philip, secretary of the Lon-Chamber of Commerce states hat Premier Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King had asked the various provinces in the Dominion to determine and report to the committee to what extent they wished to participate in the British Empire Exhibition to be held in London, England in 1924.

The exhibition will open at Wembley Park, on the outskirts of London, early in April, 1924, and will remain open for six months. The British section, occupying nearly one million square feet of floor space, is under construction. and the great sports ground, designed to accommodate 100,000 spectators, and with every modern convenience for spectators, players and the press, is pproaching completion. This ground vill be the scene of various athletic contests between different parts of the empire, en route to or on return from the Olympic games in Paris.

There are many significant features of the Canadian trade with Britain, and it is thought the exhibition will present very valuable opportunity to Canatian business.

The exhibition mission is at the pres-

ent time visiting Canada, acquainting Canadians with the facts and figures, and endeavoring to ascertain to what extent Canada will participate.
