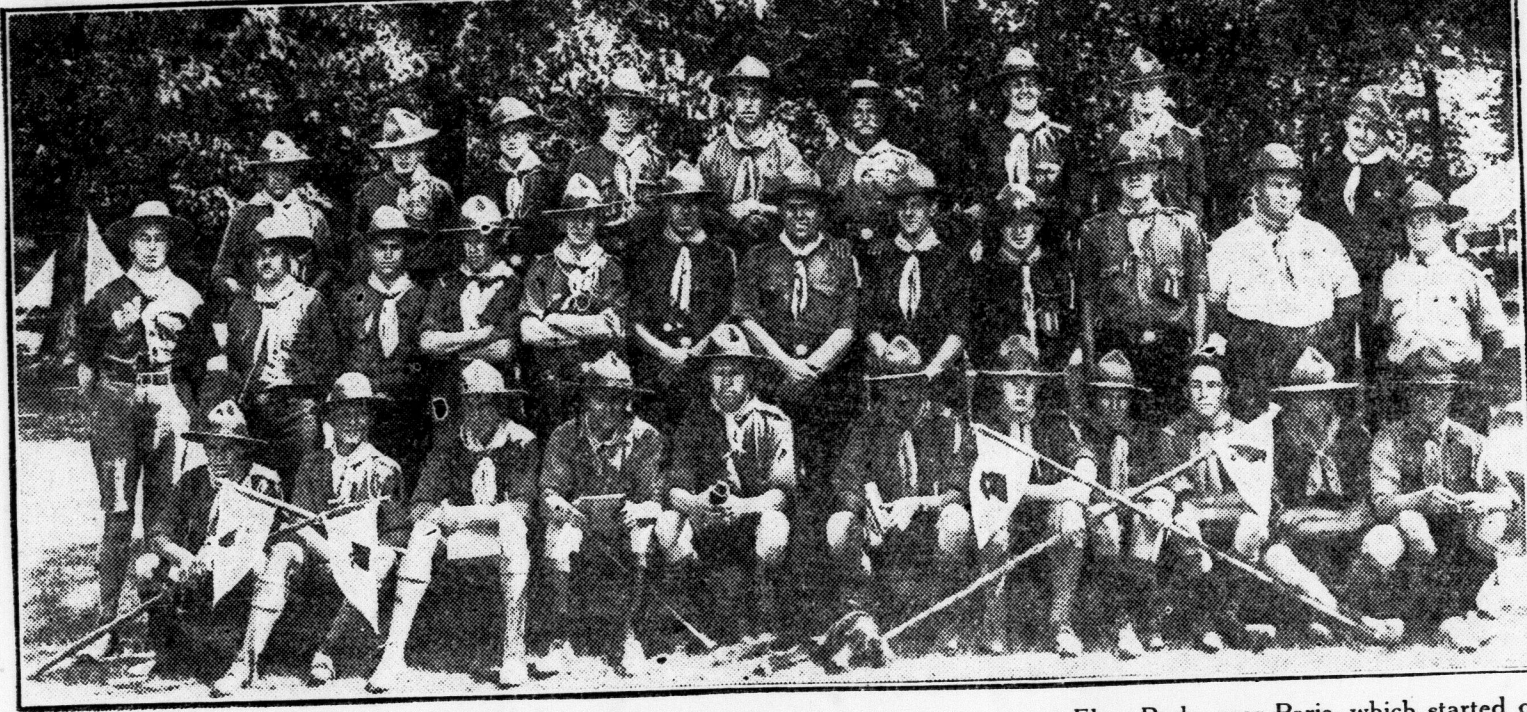

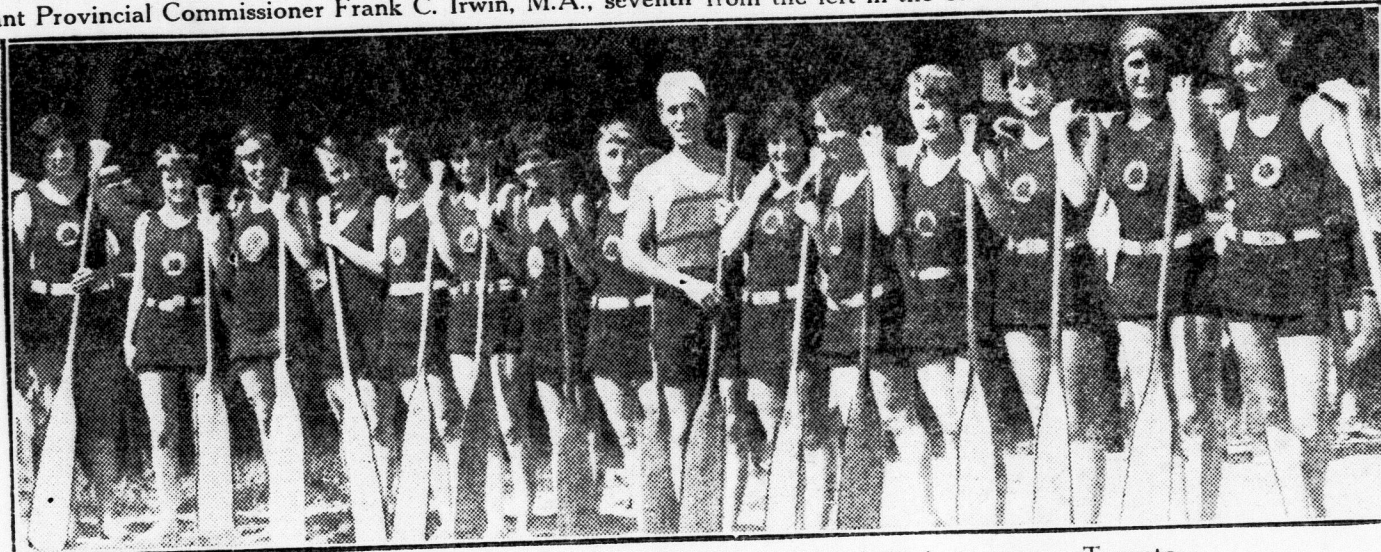

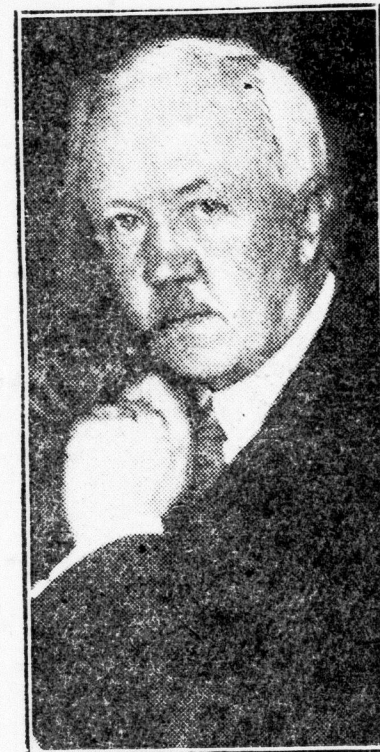
Winners in both paddling and beauty—the Balmy beach ladies' war canoe, Toronto.

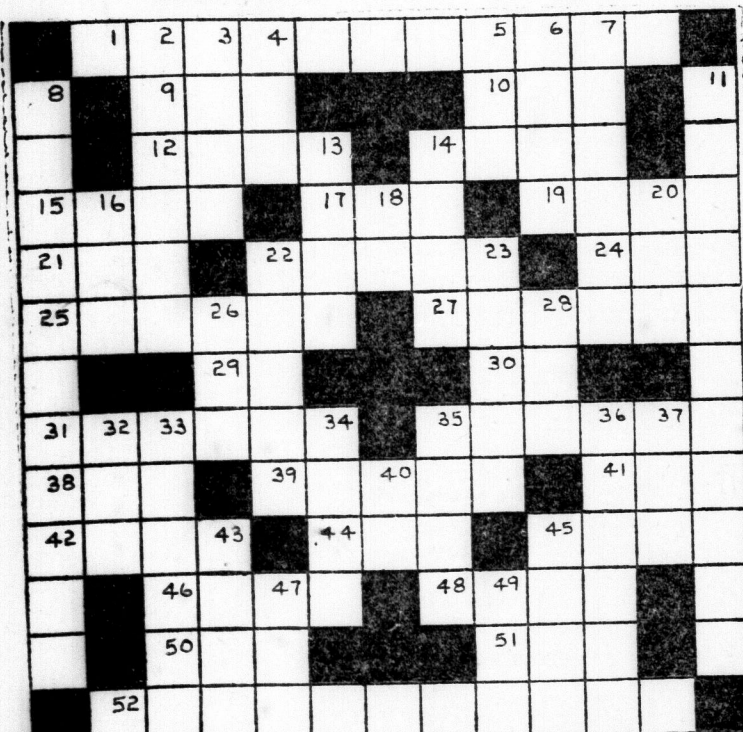


Major-General Sir Frederick Maurice, noted British military strategist, who is now lecturing in the United States.



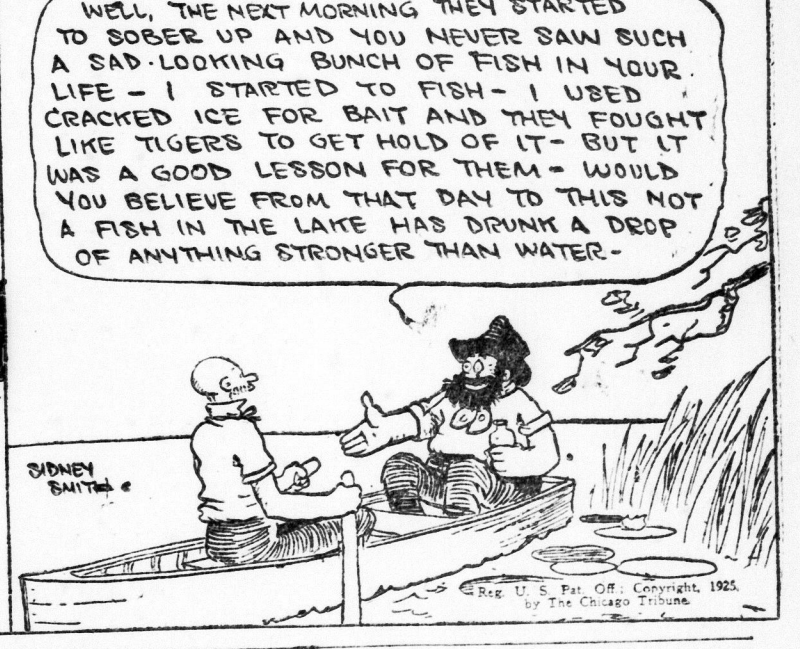
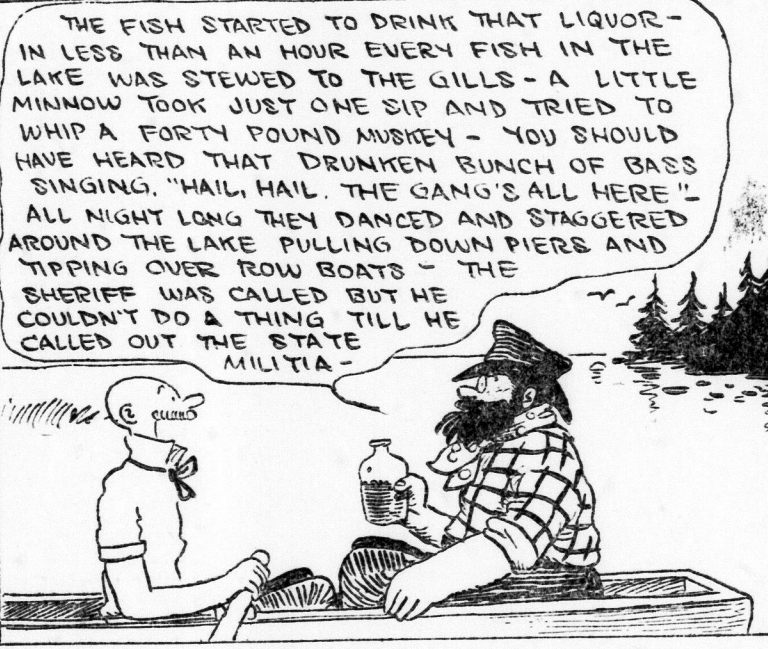
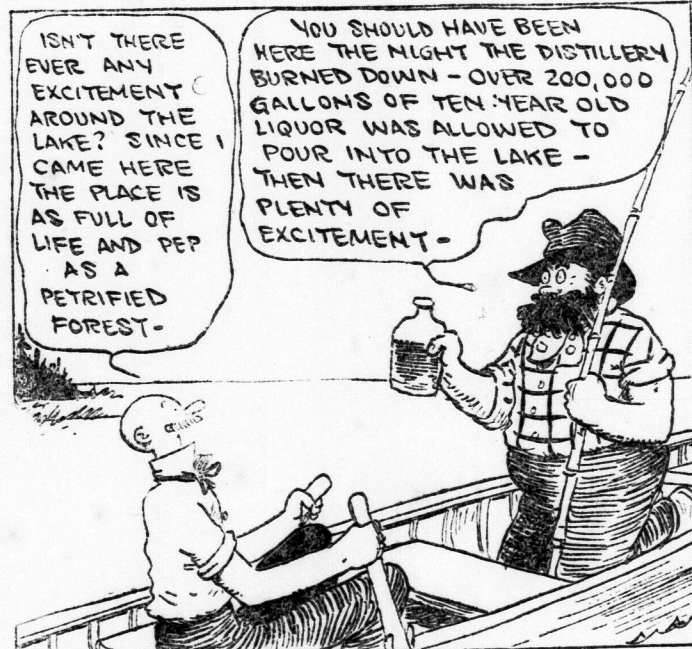
Mlle. Suzanne Lenglen, the French tennis queen, rests at her home in London after having won the Wimbledon tennis title for the sixth time.
