This has been advanced as a reason why the American duty should be raised. We are disposed to proceed on the line of reduction if, our neighbors are willing to do what is fair. If this be clearly understood, and if those in the United States who are interested in holding their Canadian market for coal bestir under the control of committees, but their Canadian market for coal bestir themselves, the increase of the American duty which you regard as likely to occur may not be made. If, however, your view is correct, and it turns out that the United States duty is raised to a high figure, then we shall claim and exercise the right to revise our views respecting the Canadian duty, and we shall feel bound to impose a duty, not only on bituminous coal, but also on anthracite coal, which at present comes into our market from the United States free of duty. We should much prefer, however, to move in the other direction, and we shall still hope that nothing may occur at Washington to prevent our carrying out our desires.


