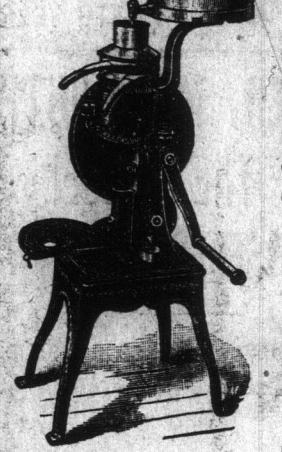

# JURY DISAGREES IN SHIP JOINERS SUIT

Witness Affirms That J. Watters Offered to Settle Strike for Monetary Consideration

The jury in the suit brought against the B. C. Marine Railway company by Robert S. Stewart, the old country ship joiner, to recover his baggage and secure damages for detention thereof, in the county court, before His Honor Judge Lammiman, was unable to agree after several hours consideration of the evidence Wednesday afternoon, and the action will come up for trial again. The jury took the case before luncheon but had not reported at 2 o'clock, when an adjournment was taken till 4 o'clock. When the court convened the jury of five members of the jury filed into court and announced that they had been unable to agree and that there was no prospect of an agreement. The jury was accordingly dismissed.

J. E. Bird, of Vancouver, who appeared for the plaintiffs, immediately asked his honor to name a date for a retrial and also asked that the similar cases of the other nine ship joiners against the same firm be consolidated with the Stewart case. His honor pointed out that this application should come from the defendant and when E. M. Eberts, who acted for the defendant, objected to such a procedure, the matter dropped. Monday, June 24, was fixed as the date of the next trial.

Only two witnesses were examined Wednesday morning before the case was concluded. Andrew J. Bechtel, managing director of the Victoria Machinery company, made the rather sensational statement that during the recent strike J. Watters, of the Boilermakers' union, who called the men out, had offered to declare the strike off and order the men back to work if it was made for his while. According to Mr. Bechtel, Watters wanted \$250 and in return he would agree to recall the men to work in Victoria to work elsewhere. At this point Mr. Bird entered an objection to the inclusion of the evidence in the case, claiming that it was irrelevant. The court agreed with him and the evidence was stricken out.

H. F. Bullen in reply to a question from Mr. Bird as to whether he held the baggage in security for payment said that the men would be paid for them and also surety that they would go to work.

Mr. Eberts in an address to the jury said the only question at issue was whether the defendants were justified in retaining the baggage.

Mr. Bird claimed that the men had no agreement to work with the Marine Railway company and the latter had no right to retain the baggage. He asked for damages to the extent of \$3.00 for each day the plaintiff was unable to work by reason of the retention of his tools by the plaintiff. His honor left it to the jury to decide with the comment that it remained with them to say which side they believed, as there was a material difference in the stories of the two parties to the action.

# ASK CANCELLATION OF FISH CONCESSION

Vancouver Board of Trade Takes Action—New England Company to Change

Vancouver, June 5.—The local board of trade last evening resolved to petition the Dominion Government asking that the special concession to the New England Fish Company allowing it to ship fish to the United States in bond free of duty be not extended. The Government will also be requested to give a definition as to what are territorial waters between Puget Sound and Alaska.

This action was decided upon on motion of Mr. G. Bell-Irving and Mr. Gilman, at the regular meeting of the board, after the members had been addressed by Mr. G. P. Batson, who urged upon the board the necessity for the strict enforcement of the fishery laws of the Dominion.

Mr. Batson said that British subjects were at a great disadvantage as compared with the fishermen of the wonderful wealth that awaited Canadian fishermen if they were but given a fair chance to compete with men who come here from the other side. Mr. Batson said he had gone to Ottawa on several occasions and presented the matter in its true light to the authorities there. Mr. Macpherson, in his speech which appeared in the Vancouver World of January 25th, had uttered many untruths, in an endeavor to uphold the Government in its policy of the concession to these people. It had been argued that there would be no market for the fish of a Canadian firm such as the New England Fish Company, but anyone, he said, who had given the subject any study would not entertain such an idea for a minute. In closing he asked that the board take some action in the matter and also asked that an endeavor be made to have the Canadian laws enforced to the letter.

The position taken by the board of trade was that local capital could not possibly be attracted to a fish company in the American markets and pay \$20 per ton duty on fish.

It is estimated that the bonding privilege which the board thought expired at the end of June has been endeavoring to renew until the end of the year. The New England people announce they will be in Vancouver within two months and establish headquarters at Bellingham, but will have a Canadian steamer to be built at Victoria, to handle all Canadian business and compete with Canadian companies.

The board of trade also asked the government to define whether or not Hecate Strait and Dixon's Entrance were territorial waters of the British sea.

The New England people state that the steamer Sandown, which was waiting at Comox for 500 tons of bunker coal for her voyage to Guaymas with a cargo of sleepers from Japan, proceeded on Sunday with but 150 tons of coal. This was all that could be secured.
