DILLON DEFENDS BUYCOTTING AND THE MOONLIGHTERS.

London, June 7 - Davitt, in a speech at Liverpool last night, said he favored the land becoming national property. He considered the soil of Ireland could be purchased for the tenants for £140,000,000 government bonds, payable in 50 years. He denounced Dublin castle rule as a monstrous failure.

In the house of commons there was a de-bate on the amendment to the repression bill offered by Russell (liberal) defining in-timidation as threats or acts of violence to timidation as threats or acts of violence to person or property or incitement thereto. Dillon defended the system of boycotting which he had advocated in public speeches as within the law. He declared that but for that system "moonlight" outrages would have begun a year earlier than they did. They would not have begun at all if the land league had been left at liberty. He admitted the system of boycotting had been grossly abused for the gratification of private malice. Harcourt said the government was willing to accept any amendment consistent with putting down boycotting. Cowen (radical) said he desired the same treatment for Irish tenants as for English trades unionists. Gladstone maintained that the bill secured such treatment.
