

Ald. Maughan: "Do I understand that the chairman and Superintendent Hamilton are to remiss in their duties as not to know when an unmarked check is handed in with a builder? I would not be a member of that committee for anything. It is a disgrace. If the committee knew that the Bailey check was unmarked the members are no better than the contractors themselves. The excuse of Ald. Boustead is very ingenious, but is will not wash."

Ald. Dodds moved for the ruling of the shair, whether the Council could really pass the report in the face of the informality. The shairman of the committee of the whole; Ald. Harvie, ruled that a majority of the Council could carry the report. Ald. Dodds appealed against the decision of the chair, but was overruled, and the report was adopted in committee.

In council with the Mayor in charge, when the Waterworks report came up. Aid. Dodds, accorded by Ald. Shaw, moved that new coal tenders be called for, and that the Waterworks Committee be instructed to advertise again.

Aid. Carlyle (St. And.) said that there was no doubt that the Bailey tender was informal, and if an informal tender was to be accepted, why not accept ex-Ald. Regers' tender? However, now that the thing had got this far, although it was not a square deal, he would vote for the adoption of the report, as it would save the citizens several thousands of dollars. Ald. Manghan returned to the charge again, and wrung from Ald. Boustend that the tender had been altered after having passed the Waterworks Committee. Ald. McMillan, Baxter and half a dozen theirs spoke on the subject. The amendment was lost by 10 years to 18 mays.

Arain Ald. Dodds demanded the ruling of the chair set to the formality of the act of the Waterworks Committee in recommending the Bailey contract. The Mayor ruled that it was all in perfect order, and the much vexed constract passed into law.

The Council tackled several other important gubjects which are referred to elsewhere, and did not get through until 12.45 this morting.
