The Gas Company's Bad Faith in Refusing Cheap Gas.

MUST MR. PEARSON REALLY RESIGN

And Will Such a Step Relieve the Directors of Their Unpleasant Responsibility ?— How the Legislature was Worked so That the Money Could be Divided-Where the Money Has Gone-The Com-

pany's Independent Conduct. It has already been shown from the Company's own Minute Book and reports that its principal object in increasing the stock from \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000 was to make a free gift to the shareholders of the premiums on the new \$1,000,000 stock, and that it was a scheme originating in a greedy desire to get round the provision in the charter limiting profits to ten per cent. The company is controlled by the shareholders for their own benefit, and that they seek in every way to make as much money as possible need not surprise anyone.
