

NEW EDUCATIONAL BUREAU PLANNED

National Organization Would Act in Advisory Capacity Only TO PLAN DOMINION POLICY Project Is Suggested by Head of Toronto University

TORONTO, Oct. 30.—(Canadian Press Dispatch).—Convening to-day at the Parliament Buildings for the conference to which Premier Durney had invited them, provincial ministers and deputy ministers of education spent their initial session in an endeavor to evolve a tangible organization which would realize certain aims. The body which they were seeking to establish was the national educational bureau, but at the end of the day's deliberations it had reached only the stage of being sent to a committee for consideration.

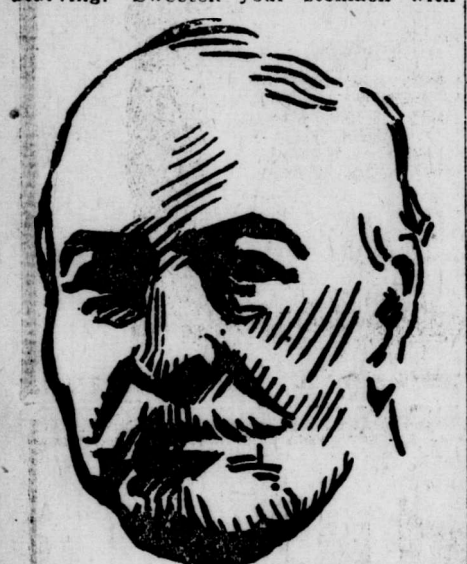
This committee is to submit proposals to-morrow.

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ering, will require to function toward a national educational policy without in any way interfering with each province's local autonomy. In fact, the only field which the general sentiment of the delegates was willing to accord it, was that of a research body, which would collect and disseminate facts regarding the new educational movements in all parts of the world. Speakers suggested that it be modeled somewhat after the lines of the bureau at Washington, which is doing very effective work.

ONLY ADVISORY.

Sir Robert Falconer, president of Toronto University, introduced the project to the gathering and emphasized that the bureau would operate only in an advisory capacity.

Rev. Dr. S. J. Cody, a former Ontario minister of education, in an address which followed, also conceded that the bureau would have no actual control of policies, but he was certain, nevertheless, that a national policy of education could be fostered by its work. The delegates to the conference during the day enjoyed the hospitality of the Ontario Government officials. They were entertained at luncheon in the Speaker's apartments. Speakers at the luncheon stressed the necessity for an educational policy that would be national in its scope, and which would thus be a factor in the unification of the entire country behind common ideals and aspirations.

MR. FIELDING OPENS NEGOTIATIONS AT PARIS

Canadian Finance Minister Seeks Trade Treaty With France

PARIS, Oct. 30.—(Canadian Press Cable).—The Canadian minister of finance, Hon. W. S. Fielding, began a series of conferences with M. Doin, French minister of commerce and representatives of the foreign office this afternoon in the Quai d'Orsay with a view to settling various commercial questions of mutual interest to the two countries.

The conversations will probably continue for several days and may possibly result in a formal agreement or treaty affecting the trade between Canada and France.

Hon. Ernest Lapointe, one of the Canadian delegates to the international labor conference in Geneva and minister of marine and fisheries in the Ottawa Government, is expected to participate in the conference later.

HAVE DESCRIPTIONS OF STOUFFVILLE BANDITS

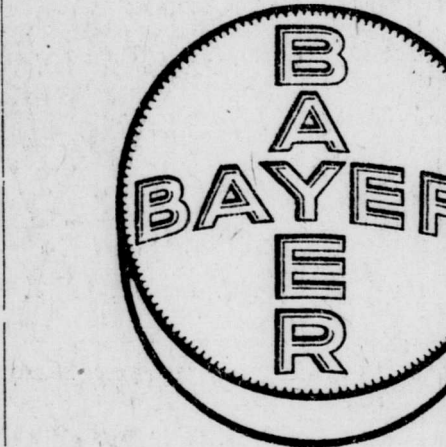

LEAP TO SAFETY FROM WINDOWS

Workers, Caught in Burning Factory, Escape in This Way

ONE DEAD AT BROOKLYN

Report That Fifteen Girls Are Missing Not Confirmed

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—One man was killed and more than a dozen persons were injured to-night when a five-story factory building on South 13th street in Brooklyn was destroyed by fire.

A report, which could not be confirmed, said that 15 girls were trapped in the upper floors of the building, occupied by shirt factories, as the flames swept up from the cellar and ground floor, which was used as a plant for the manufacture of shellac, by the Kasheer Chatfield Company.

A hasty search of the building by firemen at midnight failed to reveal any of the bodies of the 15 girls reported to have been trapped in the structure. Many persons leaped from the windows to the ground to escape the flames.

Contradictory statements as to the number of persons in the building at the time of the fire were made to the authorities. Employers who leased the top floors as shirt factories said that all the girls had left before the fire started.

A girl who escaped said the only persons on the fourth floor were her employer and two salesmen, all of whom were rescued.

The dead man is Eugene Kerstein, of Bellmore, N.Y. Four of the injured are said to be in a critical condition.

PLAN DRIVE FOR LAKE-SEA PLAN

Advocates of Scheme in United States Congress Seek Action

PROPOSE LEGISLATION

Reports Persist That Canada Will Open Negotiations

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—(Associated Press Dispatch).—Advocates in Congress of the St. Lawrence waterway scheme are reported to be planning a drive for this project by way of legislation. Efforts to amend the subsidy measure or to amend proposed railroad legislation may be made.

Most leaders in Congress, and the Administration, however, see no prospect of getting anywhere until a treaty has been made with Canada covering the project. Reports persist that the Canadian Government will be ready to open up the subject diplomatically this winter, but whether in connection with the Great Lakes treaty or in separate negotiations is a matter for conjecture.

FORMER LONDONER IS KILLED IN N. Y. STATE

Luke Robinson, Former Street Railway Employee, Who Made Good in New York, Meets Death.

MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—Run down by an automobile at White Plains, N. Y., while crossing the street on Tuesday evening last, Luke Robinson, superintendent of the Montreal Park and Island Railway Company from 1895 to 1900, died on Saturday in White Plains Hospital. Several ribs had been broken and there were also internal injuries to the head.

Mr. Robinson rose from a platform employee of the street railway system of London, Ont., to a large business of his own in New York.

He leaves a widow and three daughters.

OUTRAGE IN DUBLIN

Attempt to Blow Up Police Building; Much Damage Done.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—An attempt was made to blow up Oriel House, the headquarters of the Free State Government's criminal investigation department, late to-night, according to a Dublin dispatch to The Times.

Five rifles had been hidden in the cellar and one of them was exploded by electricity from outside the building, which was considerably damaged.

Several persons were slightly injured and many windows in the Merion Square district were broken.

L. G. WARNS THE UNIONIST CHIEFS

Will Retaliate If His Safe Seats Are Contested

RESENTS YOUNGER'S PLAN

May Develop Into Welshman Making Real Try for Premiership

LONDON, Oct. 30.—(Associated Press Cable).—David Lloyd George may attempt to regain the premiership and the general election may develop into a fight after all. Lloyd George headquarters announced to-night that if the Conservatives continued to nominate candidates, as they have since Saturday, in the constituencies considered safely Lloyd Georgeian, the National Liberals would retaliate and the fight would really be on "the question of proceeding actually with the old coalition agreement" as one party manager put it to-night.

Mr. Lloyd George's whole case, as he has admitted himself, is that a "party war isn't the thing for the country at this time," it is explained. "There is no doubt, it is true, but we have been following the same lines as before, nominating only 165 candidates for the seats we hold."

Mr. Lloyd George's plan is merely to hold these seats and return to the Commons with a group sufficiently numerous to give him a voice, if no office; but he won't stand a raid on that group.

"We have 165 men actually in the field now, and 15 straining at the leash, anxious to contest their constituencies. If the Conservatives interpret Sir George Younger's letter as encouraging them to invade our districts we shall invade theirs."

Although it has been officially stated that the move was no definite result of the Whittingham conference, the above statement may be taken as a reflection of Mr. Lloyd George's views after discussing the situation with the Earl of Balfour, Sir Robert Stevenson Horne and Austen Chamberlain and possibly after an exchange of views with Mr. Bonar Law, the prime minister.

BONAR LAW'S STAND.

Mr. Bonar Law is believed to be personally agreeable to letting the Lloyd Georgeians maintain the majority of seats now held by them. Lord Beaverbrook, however, is waging a vigorous campaign to compel the nomination of Conservative candidates in every constituency in England.

Notwithstanding the ambiguity of Younger's letter, he is known to be a bitter personal enemy of Mr. Lloyd George. He has never forgiven nor forgotten the reference to him as "our cabin boy" at the time of the first manifestation of Unionist impatience at Mr. Lloyd George's leadership at the Genoa conference. Hence the Lloyd Georgeians charge him with co-operating with Lord Beaverbrook against Mr. Bonar Law's inclinations in actually encouraging the nomination of Conservative in Lloyd Georgeian territory, in spite of the fact that his letter permits co-operation.

Actual Conservative support is being given Lloyd George candidates now in only five London and 22 provincial districts. Since the Younger letter came out Conservatives have been nominated in 27 districts where the Lloyd Georgeians expected a walkover, or only a tight fight with the Asquithians, or Labor. Whatever the maneuvering going on in the Bonar Law and Lloyd George wings the Labor vote undoubtedly will be a contest. The same probably is true of the Asquithians, save the Asquithian vote will be insignificant.

Therefore, wherever there is a real fight between the Conservatives and the National Liberals, it will be Labor's gain, and this will be a powerful argument to induce Sir George Younger and even Lord Beaverbrook to cease demanding a straight-cut Conservative House and Government.

Everywhere it is recognized now that Mr. Lloyd George is playing all his cards with a view to that explains his political pre-eminence for so long, and those are not lacking who believe that he is outmaneuvering his opponents, and that he may come back to find himself in Downing street once more, with Mr. Bonar Law living next door after Parliament reassembles.

ONTARIO APPLES TAKE MANY PRIZES AT LONDON

Capture Majority of Awards in Overseas Section Open to Growers and Exporters.

TORONTO, Oct. 30.—According to a cable received by the Hon. Mr. D. B. Dewar, minister of agriculture, Ontario secured most of the prizes in the Imperial London fruit show in the overseas section of the exhibition. The exhibition of fruit in any part of the British Empire, other than Great Britain and Ireland, began the hearing of Cecil R. Peckover's suit to restrain the City of Toronto from making an agreement with the board of harbor commissioners of Toronto giving a right-of-way for a six-track radial railway entrance into the city.

M. Meredith began the hearing of Cecil R. Peckover's suit to restrain the City of Toronto from making an agreement with the board of harbor commissioners of Toronto giving a right-of-way for a six-track radial railway entrance into the city.

The Toronto Board of Trade is a plaintiff in the case, as well as Mr. Peckover.

Mayor Maguire, on the witness stand, said the City Council had a mandate from the people to give the free right-of-way in question, but that the agreement had not yet been executed.

Judgment was reserved.

MISSIONARIES TAKEN BY CHINESE BANDITS

Town of Shang Tsai Looted and Partly Destroyed by Mob.

SHANGHAI, Oct. 30.—A bandit army that looted and partly destroyed the town of Shang Tsai, Province of Honan, Saturday night, carried off H. E. N. Ledgard, of the China Inland Mission, and other missionary workers, according to word received here. Mrs. Ledgard and her children eluded the raiders and escaped.

Rev. F. A. Steven, representative here

of the China-Inland Mission, said that as far as he knew there were no Canadian missionaries in Shang Tsai. Mr. Ledgard is a native of England, who first went to China in 1900. Mrs. Ledgard is also a native of England and went out in 1914. They returned to China only recently after a furious war.

Rev. G. A. Brownlee, of Toronto, said last night that Mr. and Mrs. Ledgard were the sole missionaries at Shang Tsai unless others happened to be visiting them.

SAW FIRES CREEPING ON HAILEYBURG FIVE DAYS BEFORE DISASTER

HAILEYBURG, Oct. 30.—Bernard Hartley, a Haileyburg boy, presented evidence to the fire marshal to-day to the effect that he saw fires working towards Haileyburg from Constant Lake five days before the recent disaster, but he did not see anyone attempting to check the spread. The inquiry, opened in Toronto last week, was resumed here this morning.

KITCHENER MILLERS OFF TO OTTAWA ON FREIGHT RATES CASE

KITCHENER, Oct. 30.—A deputation of millers from this city left for Ottawa to-night to protest discrimination against them in the matter of freight rates. Ontario millers claim that under the existing conditions Western flour can be shipped to Eastern ports at a more favorable freight rate than flour from Eastern mills. This applies to both land and water shipments. W. D. Euler, M.P., accompanied the delegation.
