A Valuable Car Lot of Turnip Seed

Over 30,000 lbs of Swede turnip seed and 13,000 lbs of mangel seed grown by the Experimental Station, Kentville, was shipped to Ottawa last week. To this shipment was added 8000 pounds of swede turnip seed grown at Nappan by the Experimental Farm there, making a car lot valued at nearly \$45,000.00. This seed is to be sold to Agricultural Organizations at \$1.15 per pound for turnips and the mangel seed at 75 cts. per pound. Farmers' Organizations wishing to secure this seed should correspond with M. O. Malte, Dominion Agrostologist, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, Ont.


