PAINTED PORTRAIT OF THE PRINCE  
Mrs. H. H. McAvity, of Halifax, Finishes Her Picture of His Royal Highness.  
Many Nova Scotia friends of Mrs. H. H. McAvity will be interested in the following, which appears in the Westminster Gazette, of London, of December 12th:  
THE PRINCE'S RIBBONS  
Interest in details of his new portrait: Mrs. McAvity, the Canadian painter, has finished her picture of the Prince of Wales, which she made at the special request of the Government of Nova Scotia. The Prince is shown in naval uniform. "I found him a most patient sitter," said Mrs. McAvity, in an interview. "He was most interested in the portrait, especially in the medal ribbons, and he carefully compared those he was wearing with those in the picture."  
The sittings took place in the Prince's drawing-room at St. James' Palace. The final one took place just before he sailed for India.  
"The picture is now being framed, and next week Queen Alexandra, who has honored me by asking to see it, will examine it at a private view. "Afterwards it will be sent to Canada in time for the winter session of the Nova Scotia Parliament."
