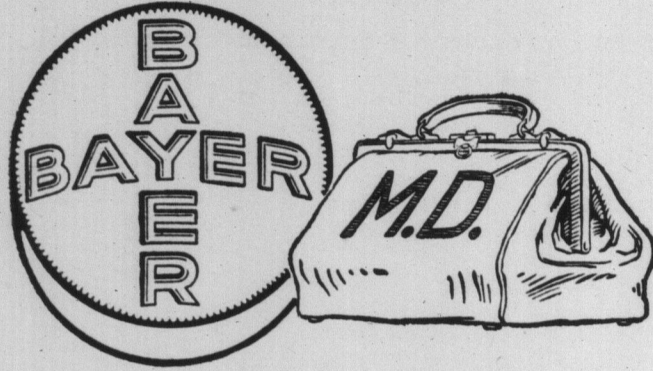

HOME BANK DIRECTORS' BONDS FOR \$627,000 BREAK ALL BAIL RECORDS FOR CANADIAN COURTS

Toronto.—With the bail bonds totalling \$627,000 all Canadian bail records are smashed to smithereens, it is believed, by the case of the Home Bank officers, directors, and officials now under arrest on various charges arising out of the bank's failure.

President H. J. Daly is at liberty on bail amounting to \$102,000. His bondsmen are Frank McLaughlin, T. N. Phelan, K. C., Frank O'Connor, W. J. Cluff, Ernest Sprague and Charles T. Willoughby, each in the amount of \$17,000. President Daly, who is now reported seriously ill, is charged with having negligently signed a false return to the Department of Finance.

S. Casey Wood, director, Toronto; "concurring in a false or deceptive statement," \$50,000, by Ward Wright and Thomas Reid, his partners.

Clarence F. Smith, director, Montreal; "concurring in a false or deceptive statement," \$50,000, by Wm. T. Kernahan and J. J. O'Neill.

C. A. Barnard, director, Montreal; "concurring in a false or deceptive statement," \$100,000, by Joseph Wright and William J. Green.

A. E. Calvert, assistant general manager; "being assistant manager of the Home Bank, did negligently sign a return on or about June 18th to the Minister of Finance and Receiver-General respecting the affairs of the said bank, containing false or deceptive statements contrary to the Bank Act," \$25,000, by J. J. O'Neill and C. C. Richardson.

MODERN WAREHOUSE REPLACES ONE BURNED

Berwick.—The Berwick Fruit Company's apple warehouse, which was destroyed by fire last February, has been rebuilt, and is larger and more commodious than before. The contractors for the building were J. H. Hicks & Sons, of Bridgetown. The building is 250 feet long and 60 feet wide, and is three stories high, and has a floor space of half an acre. It has a capacity of 60,000 barrels of apples. It is built of interlocking tiling, and is both fireproof and fire-proof. The packing room is equipped with a double capacity grader, specially constructed by J. W. Hutchinson, and is the only one of its kind used in the province. It is run by electric power, and takes a crew of seven men to manipulate and regulate the supply of apples. Electric carriers are being installed to transmit the barrels of apples from one to another. At the east end of the building are the offices for the staffs of the company and the Kings Mutual Fire Insurance Company. John N. Chute is manager, and A. W. Hillz, foreman.

The Berwick Fruit Company was the first company to undertake co-operative shipping, in 1907.

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BRITISH OFFER TO INCREASE PREFERENCE

Dried Fruits to be Admitted Free From All Parts of Empire.—Preserved and Canned Fruits to be Admitted on the Same Terms as Sugar—Preference Also on Tobacco.

London.—On behalf of the British Government, Sir Philip Lloyd-Greame, President of the Board of Trade, made the Dominion delegates to the Economic Conference a definite offer of an increased and stabilized preference in the British markets. The offer covers dried and preserved fruits, including canned fruits, also sugar and tobacco produced anywhere within the Empire.

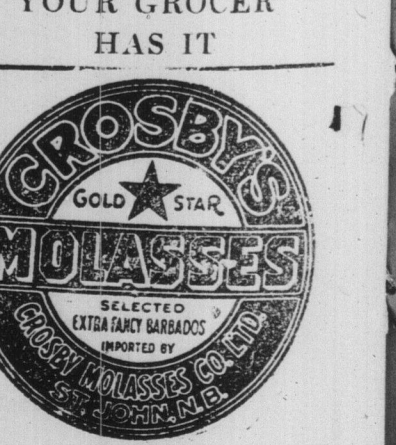
