wheat, and a falling off in corn and oats. The receipts of butter, wool, hides, seeds, potatoes, coal, cotton, tobacco—all show a handsome increase. We are inclined to think that Chicago does not stand alone in these experiences, but that many communities, as well as many individuals, who were "talking blue" all last year, were simply following the force of the habit acquired by contagion at the time of the September panic, the year before, rather than giving utterance to their actual experiences. Of course, nothing that is here said is to be understood as questioning the unfavorable facts which continue to confron! us as to the backward condition of many of the leading industries of the country. There is but little probability, in the prevailing temper of the public mind, that these will be overlooked in any event; and as the tendency is to lose sight receipts of butter, wool, hides, seeds, potatoes, any event; and as the tendency is to lose sight of the "silver lining" in the chronic gazing on the black cloud of dead and gone September, it is but right to let it have a fair place in the foreground.
