An attendance of 20,000 was registered at one day's meetings.

Carnegio Hall held some 4,600 intent hearers at each of the vorning and ovening sessions. Nor du they seem, for the most part, to be gearers of the word only.

Baptists were well to the front, in delegates and missionary speakers, in presiding officers and committeemen; best of all, in reports of prospering outposts and enlarging vision.
