ers. The perfons proferibed will neceffarily find fome defenders; a combat will enfue, and fuch Members of the Convention as fhall have been led aftray, will be themfelves mailacred.—The National Reprefentation will then be deftroyed; the flaves of civil war will break forth; and the departments and the armies will be divided.

A prey to anarchy, there no longer remains to France any rallying point, During these intervals, all the Powers at the fame time attack our frontiers, the Aristocrats shew themseves, and the Counter Revolution is effected.

Citizens! this is the abyfs into which you are about to be precipitated, if, notwithftanding all that you have just heard, you pertist in following the inftigations of those who millead you. I call Heaven to witness, it is for your welfare alone that I speak.—If you could see the bottom of my heart, you would there discover how much I abhor flavery, how much I adore Liberty; it is she who at this moment inspires me.

I owe to my country the Declaration that I have made, I have difcharged my conficience; and, firm at my poft, I wait the event.

I love the people too well not to use my utmost endeavours to fave them from the effects of their own madnels; and if, in the excels of their blindnels, it should happen, that in this Chair I should receive their attacks, covered with wounds I will still offer up my prayers for their happinels; and my last words shall be. "O God ! preferve the liberty of my country, and pardon these murderers; they know not what they do."

Last advices from the combined armies, are of the 4th of June. They were then employed in the leiges of Valenciennes and Condé. Nothing of confequence had happened fince the Action of the 23d of May, in which they fucceded in driving the French from their camp at Farmars.

Custine, it is faid, is gone to take command of the French army, in that quarter.

NEW-YORK, August 4.

Many of the unhappy fufferers from Capé-François, are arrived here and in feveral other ports of the Union, and very liberal contributions have been made for their relief.

On the 1ft inft. an engagement happened, off the hook, between the Bofton English, Frigate, and the French Frigate L'Ambuscade. It seems to have been a drawn battle between them. The Ambuscade is returned into this port; having suffered very much in the action, and had 14 of her men killed. There is no word yet from the Boston.
