Prior to the distribution of prizes Mr. Hale Sanders, the principal of the school, explained that with the exception of the special prizes, all the others were based not merely upon the final examinations, but upon the notes obtained by the pupils during the year. Parents who had followed the notes obtained by their children during the year would understand why the rule followed in this institution. The rule followed in this institution was that the fairest that could be adopted. In some schools every boy got a prize, but such was not the case here. No pupil received a reward without having merited it. In many cases it would be found that a few boys carried off nearly all the prizes in their class. They were not merely clever boys, because many talented pupils failed to secure prizes, they were those who had attended well to their home studies, and whose parents were not willing to allow them to stay away from school for every trifling reason. If the parents would co-operate with the teachers the best results would follow for the boys.

At the close of the programme Rev. Father Quinn spoke in his usual fatherly and impressive manner. It was easy to see that the Rev. pastor of St. Patrick's was more than pleased with the proceedings. He called upon Mr. Justice Doherty who, in a brief but pointed address, spoke of the benefits to be derived from the High School which he was glad to see already doing so much good. It was its promise for the future that was most interesting and hopeful. He wished the school every prosperity in its career of usefulness.

Mr. Justice Curran said that the Rev. Father Quinn had a great repugnance to having anything mentioned about his endeavors to improve the condition of his people, yet he must excuse him if he referred to the fact that as pastor of St. Patrick's he had faced a great undertaking in assuming the responsibility of building the High School, and that he had the proud satisfaction of knowing that he was presiding at the first annual distribution of prizes with the edifice paid for from a school to roof. (Applause). The land was still owing for, but the same spirit that had enabled him to meet the payments for the building would, in due time, provide for clearing off the debt from the grounds. The speaker thought that he had noticed a sort of peering look in Father Quinn's eye during the entertainment. He was no doubt thinking that some of the boys who had done so well on the stage that evening would, in a few years, pass from the High School to the course of philosophy in the Grand Seminary, and that one day he would have, from amongst them, colleagues in the illustrious Order of St. Basilice, who would be heard from the pulpit of their own St. Patrick's. (Great applause). After referring to the High School, its aims and objects, for commerce and industry, as well as a training ground in elementary classics, he spoke of the great interest manifested in the "Kilkeegan Prize" for Irish history. It was a deplorable fact that to the present time they could take up the curriculum of any of the institutions of higher or intermediate education, and in not one of them would they find that Irish history had a place. They were here in a free country, others were proud of their ancestry and properly so. Should not the descendants of the ancient race cherish its traditions? Should they not know, not merely its trials and tribulations but its glories as well? Ireland was but a small island, but in all the arts of peace and war were not her children amongst the most distinguished? As descendants of the Irish race they had much to be proud of, and they would not be worse Canadians because they had learned the story of the "gem of the ocean." A patriotic Irish Canadian had given the prize for this study. His noble deed would bear good fruit, in fact, it had done so already. Would not others imitate his example? The study of Irish history would beget a love of historical studies generally. In this and in every branch he hoped the good beginning would go on and improve. They had a devoted principal and zealous teachers. The pupils must strive to keep up the name of the institution, and give it a place of honor amongst educational establishments. They would thus not only benefit themselves, but prove worthy descendants of the Old Land, useful and patriotic citizens of the Dominion of Canada.

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The annual distribution of prizes to the pupils of St. Patrick's Boys' School took place in the Seminary Hall on Friday afternoon, 22d. Father Quinn presided, and Fathers M. Callaghan, Spellman, Hallisey, and McGrath sat at each side of him. The hall was full to overflowing, and the many and prolonged applause of those present showed how highly they appreciated the sprightly items that the boys presented.

The operette, "The Hermit's Legacy" was the leading feature of the programme, and the efficient manner in which the different roles were interpreted, spoke highly in favor of the training of the pupils, and their remarkable histrionic talent.

The musical portion, under the able direction of Prof. J. O'Donnell, was

in keeping with what may be expected from such experienced and genial leadership.

The rapidity and ease with which the senior pupils wrote, and read shorthand dictations in English and French elicited rounds of applause from the admiring hundreds. Master W. Murphy, in particular, creditably exhibited the high rate of speed attainable, even by boys of thirteen or fourteen.

When, at the close, the reverend pastor rose to advise the boys as to the proper manner in recreating themselves during the holidays, he complimented the pupils on their gentlemanly bearing and remarkably neat appearance.

Masters W. Murphy and P. O'Brien, the first and second pupils, respectively, were awarded the scholarship, which entitles them to three years of free tuition at Mount St. Louis.

CATHOLIC COMMERCIAL ACADEMY

The closing exercises in connection with the Catholic Commercial Academy, St. Catherine street, took place

Monday afternoon. There were present: Mgr. Racicot, the Rev. Father Bedard, chaplain; Mr. Philip Demers, president of the Catholic School Board; Mr. Archambault, secretary of the board; Mr. Semple, ex-commissioner, and H. O. Dore, principal of Champlain School. The prizes were numerous and valuable, and were distributed by the visitors above mentioned, Principal A. Leblond de Brumath and, in the case of some special prizes, by the donors of the same. Short addresses were delivered by Mgr. Racicot, President Demers, the Rev. Father Bedard and Mr. Semple. They congratulated the teachers, pupils and parents upon the excellent progress made by the pupils; they thought teachers should be better paid, and they were of the opinion that they could not have proper education unless religion was mixed with the instruction. Edouard Roy got a silver medal and fifty dollars for general success throughout the year.

The Comte prize of fifty dollars was awarded to N. Danseur, eighth year, for general proficiency. A gold cross, the gift of the Hon. Boucher de la Bruere, was awarded to Robert Dean, sixth year, for marked success. A bronze medal, the gift of the Hon. L. H. Jette, was given to A. Lepine, seventh year, for marked success, etc., during the year. Alphonsus Lepine graduated from the commercial class, receiving a diploma "with great distinction," for French and English. Seven others received diplomas in this class. In the business class there were also seven graduates. Boland Lanthier being awarded the diploma for "the greatest distinction."

The academy is evidently doing much for the French youths of the city. The attendance is about three hundred per annum.
