

in full accord with the aims of the churches, the methods to be employed are not the traditional evangelistic methods, but are such as will attract the support of business men. Religious awakenings in the past have sometimes been allowed to take a morbid turn instead of being directed to the ends of Christian service. The emphasis of this movement is to be laid on social betterment, and into that field of service the newly enlisted forces will be directed. A thorough study will be made of the economic and social needs of particular communities and a determined attack upon the strongholds of evil is expected to follow.

In largeness of aim the campaign proposed is the natural complement of the work of the Laymen's Missionary movement. Such enterprises present an expansive view of Christianity and show the world and the churches what the religion of Christ really is. Denominational bodies have been doing the intensive work of Christian culture, but the great crusades against sin at home and ignorance abroad must be waged by the combined armies of the Lord.
