EXPORT AND IMPORT PERMITS ACT

EXTENSION OF LEGISLATION TO JULY 31, 1963

Hon. Gordon Churchill (Minister of Trade and Commerce) moved for leave to introduce Bill No. C-4, to amend the Export and Import Permits Act.

Some hon. Members: Explain.

Mr. Churchill: This act would lapse unless renewed this year. It is the purpose of the bill to extend the act for another period, and there are no substantial changes contemplated.

CRIMINAL CODE

AMENDMENT RESPECTING USE OF TRADING STAMPS

Mr. Frank Howard (Skeena) moved for leave to introduce Bill No. C-5, to amend the Criminal Code (trading stamps).

Some hon. Members: Explain.

Mr. Howard: The bill seeks to redefine the definition of trading stamps in subsection (b) of section 322 of the Criminal Code to make them illegal and to plug the loopholes that now exist in the code.

Motion agreed to and bill read the first time.

AMENDMENT TO ABOLISH CAPITAL PUNISHMENT EXCEPT FOR TREASON

Mr. Frank McGee (York-Scarborough) moved for leave to introduce Bill No. C-6, to amend the Criminal Code (capital punishment).

Some hon. Members: Explain.

Mr. McGee: The purpose of this bill is to abolish capital punishment in Canada, except in certain cases of treason. If you will permit, Mr. Speaker, may I say that the rules of the house prohibit a member of the Liberal party from joining in the motion to second this bill. Had it been possible, the hon. member for Fort William (Mr. Badanai) would have seconded it jointly when it was introduced.
