CONSTRUCTION OF NEW COMPUTER CENTRE AT DORVAL—EFFECT ON WINNIPEG CENTRE

VIET NAM—REPORTED SHELLING OF CONTROL COMMISSION OUTPOST—EFFECT ON CANADIAN PARTICIPATION

Mr. Doug Rowland (Selkirk): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Secretary of State for External Affairs. Has the minister any definite information he can present to the House respecting the reported shelling of an ICCS outpost in Viet Nam, and can he say whether this incident has in any way affected his judgment about how long Canada should remain there?

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Mr. Speaker, the answer to the first part of the question is that we have no direct information yet from Saigon. We are expecting it at any time.

VIET NAM—REQUEST FOR DEBATE ON CONTINUING ROLE OF CANADA IN CONTROL COMMISSION AND PLIGHT OF CIVILIAN PRISONERS

Mr. Andrew Brewin (Greenwood): I have a supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. Will the minister take this opportunity to say whether or not an opportunity will be given to the House soon to debate the whole question of the continuing role of Canada in the ICCS and another question that is disturbing many Canadians, the plight of civilian prisoners in that country?

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Mr. Speaker, before the end of the month the government must, of course, make a decision whether we will continue to participate in the International Control Commission. I will make that announcement in the House. On the question of whether it would be desirable or necessary to have a debate at that time, I certainly have a sympathetic attitude and will give the suggestion very careful consideration, as I said some weeks ago. With regard to the question of civilian prisoners, very slow progress is being made. There have been some exchanges of a few hundred prisoners on each side recently. Both

sides charge, of course, that there are hundreds of thousands of civilians still incarcerated. Unfortunately, very little progress is being made. This is one of the aspects of the peace agreement that is so disturbing.

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PROVISION OF AID TO WEST AFRICAN NATIONS STRICKEN BY FAMINE

Hon. Alvin Hamilton (Qu'Appelle-Moose Mountain): Mr. Speaker, I wish to address my question to the Secretary of State for External Affairs. In view of the urgent appeal from the Food and Agriculture Organization for help to relieve the famine in the five western African nations where some 10 million people are either dead or in a state of malnutrition, is there anything the minister can do to take the lead among Canadian ministers and among other countries by bringing some help to this hard-pressed area?

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Yes, Mr. Speaker. We have already anticipated this question. As I announced in Moncton on Friday, we have already given \$2.5 million in food aid to the area surrounding the Sahara. We are looking very sympathetically at requests for help because this is a very serious situation.
