to do in the gresent establishment? PROF. HUGHES: I think the seeming inconsistency arises from the fact that we need in this Province, two types. We need general practitioners for small in termediate schools, and then, for the larger city schools, a corps of specialists. We have to take both needs into account, it seems to me, perticularly in view of the movement towards consolidating.

DEAN LEAR SSURIER: You are wholly in sympathy, then, with the reduction in requirements.

PROF. HUGHES: I am, because it seems to me, rather than have rigid requirements of certain academic subjects, as we have now, it would be better to have the school and the Boards make their own choice in the matter of subjects, according to the needs, and the courses taken by the applicant.

THE PRINCIPAL: But, it is alleged that under that system of rur al schools there would not be available a sufficient supply of competent teachers to meet the demands. Is that correct ?

PROF. HUGHES: As a matter of cfact, we are opening the doors to other faculties and tapping new sources of recruitment which will tend to meet all demands take for example the admission of graduates in Agriculture -
