

MENTAL DEFECTIVES MUST HAVE SPECIAL TRAINING

Toronto Is Very Backward in Providing Proper Place Where Defectives Can Be Taught—Question Should Be Taken Out of Hands of Board of Education and a Commission of Experts Appointed.

To say that a "sound mind in a sound body" is a standard of mental and physical health, which presents no particularly new features, may at first glance seem something which none might question. But if we are really honest with ourselves, we shall have to admit that to a certain degree at least, where these things are found—union of sound mind and sound body—in the children and older pupils of our schools, it is for the most part due to extraneous circumstances rather than to any special endeavor of our educational system.

It seems to be a very widespread belief that if the sound mind and sound body are together it is a good thing, if not well, it must be put up with. What is, however, is not the opinion of Dr. Struthers, chief medical inspector of the schools. This gentleman, who is a university graduate, and a medical man of widespread experience, who may at the same time be placed among the young men of his profession, has lately published a most illuminating and interesting report, which shows conditions as they are, and offers suggestions which in many instances would be found to be beyond price if adopted.

Dr. Struthers visited England and Germany, and as a result, his opinion is, that with regard to defective children, in particular where they are behind the countries mentioned, it is quite a while since educationalists in Europe discovered that classes for defectives carried on in the ordinary school are far from the best thing possible, and special schools where special training and continuous supervision are given are now established, which benefits arising from the establishment of these schools have proved to be immeasurably greater than those which can be obtained by the use of older methods.

Toronto is still in the stage where a special class in the ordinary school is the best provided. A rough estimate places the number of mentally defective children in the Province of Ontario at from 1000 to 2000, and Toronto has about fifty in the care of the board of education in the classes that meet for half a day in Duke, Elizabeth, Essex and Grace schools.
