### BANK ACT BATTLE NOT REALLY BEGUN

Fifty-Five Clauses of Non-Contentious Character Disposed of.

OTTAWA, Feb. 20.—Fifty-five clauses of the Bank Act bill have been passed by the house banking committee, all, however, being of non-contentious character. The real battle will begin on Wednesday next when the committee will start consideration of

the controversial clauses, of which there are about one hundred. The question of audit, inspection and protection of depositors will be the main battleground. The result of the committee's work so far is to pass without question all the clauses of the act which prescribe penalties against the banks or their officers either before or after the time of organization. Sir Edmund Osler and a number of bankers, along with Wallace Nesbitt, K.C., and Hector McInnes, K.C., for certain institutions, have closely watched the proceedings. The section maintaining the double liability of shareholders went through without objection. That authorizing action upon shareholders after insolvency was also passed. Returns Promptly Made. The requirement for monthly returns was taken up, and J. E. Armstrong enquired if the banks kept the law. "On the whole," remarked Mr. White, "the returns are made very promptly and very completely. There has been some difficulty, however, during the period of emergency circulation, but the penalties in regard to this and over-circulation are stiff. We have collected as high as a thousand dollars from one bank." The committee considered this sufficient and approved the \$50 a day penalty. Duncan Ross objected to the section respecting note issues being the first charge in cases of bank insolvency, and it was deferred. The section prohibiting undue preference to certain creditors and prescribing two years imprisonment was ratified. Mr. White stating that it would be necessary to establish willful intent before convicting. The prohibitory clause respecting the use of the word "bank" or "banker" was allowed to stand along with most of the schedule.

## "WIVES OR MARRIED WOMEN" A MEASURE IS DEFEATED, BUT LAW WILL BE ENACTED LATER

Opposition Apparently Tried to Get Ahead of the Government, But Was Forestalled—Many Important Changes to the Municipal Act—No Vote For Tenants—Corrupt Practices by Members.

The attempt of the opposition in the legislature yesterday to get credit for women's property legislation failed. Altho Hon. Mr. Hanna, on Wednesday, promised that an amendment to give married women who own property, the right to vote, would be made to the Municipal Act during the session, J. C. Elliott, Liberal, for West Middlesex, yesterday brought down a similar motion, while the act was under consideration in committee of the whole. But as the saying goes, "you got to get up very early in the morning to beat Mr. Hanna," and the Liberal's proposed legislation was voted down.

There is a clause in the act setting forth that those who are entitled to vote are males, unmarried women and widows, who, of course, have the necessary qualifications such as property, age, etc. Mr. Elliott stated that this clause should be extended by a provision allowing married women owning property the use of the municipal franchise, and he moved that the entire clause be struck out, believing that this would remedy the defect. He said there was no class of citizens as interested in municipal questions as married women.

Mr. Hanna Against. "To strike out that clause and to leave the rest of the act to stand as it is would lead to interminable confusion," said Mr. Hanna. "It would disqualify at once many men now holding municipal office, such as aldermen, Reeves and mayors in towns, townships and even cities. And it would be in direct opposition to the majority of the women who are now advocating that married women should represent their own property. Sometimes married women, thru the courtesy of their husbands, are conveyed property. These women do not want to vote, but if the clause were eliminated they would have to or their property would be unrepresented."

Mr. Hanna then said that he had stated on Wednesday that a clause was being prepared which would obviate confusion and make it consistent with the Municipal Act, the Assessment Act, and the entire Assessment Act. To give voting powers to every married woman would mean that all the property would be fully represented. Husbands, who had conveyed their holdings to their wives with the best possible motives, would be disqualified from voting. He said that the women who advocated that married women property holders be given a vote would best appreciate the endless confusion if the amendment of the opposition were adopted. He stated that a private bill covering the situation had been prepared by a member and would be introduced later, and this, with the present act, would be considered in the municipal committee and then presented to the house to be made law.

### LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR REBUKED CLERGYMAN

Sensation in Indiana Senate Caused by Command to Stop Talking Politics.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 20.—Lieutenant-Governor O'Neill caused a sensation in the senate today when he stopped the Rev. E. R. Henry of the Emmanuel Baptist Church of this city, who was making the opening prayer, and said: "Stop making a political speech." The minister had prayed for the separation of the run traffic from the state and for the day when Indiana would refuse to sell to men the right to make other men drunkards, murderers, filling prisons and benevolent institutions.

### FAMILY ALMOST ASPHYXIATED.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—(Can. Press.)—Mrs. Caroline Harding, aged 82 years, who resides at 21 Wellington road, her sister, Mrs. Marie Harper, aged 84, of 56 High street, and Mrs. Harding's grandson, Wm. Morris, aged 13, were discovered partly asphyxiated at 21 Wellington road, South London, at noon today by a neighbor. Mrs. Harding is now at Victoria Hospital, to which she was sent by Dr. Nelson George, where she is recovering. The other two victims were not affected so seriously.
