THIRTY-ONE PATIENTS

Now at Home for Incurables, States Report of That Institution.

Yesterday the fourteenth annual meeting of the Home for Incurable Children was held at the institution, 125 West Bloor street. The interest taken in the concerns of the home was shown by the large number present and by the many benefactors mentioned in the reports.

Mrs. Donald, the secretary, reported that 31 boys and 1 girl are in the home. There was one death during the year. The Sick Children's Hospital and the Home for Incurables were thanked for their co-operation in the former in attending to cases of operation and the latter in taking care of the children in the hospital limit of 17 years.

Three First Prizes. The children were reported to be doing well in every way. Three had taken first prize at the Exhibition for wood carving, raffia work and pierced brass.

Among the many who received special acknowledgment were the Dickens Fellowship Club, who gave their bazaar raised \$5000 for the institution. This had gone to endow a Dickens Fellowship club.

A cot in memory of the Rainbow Club, who worked so hard for the bazaar and a thousand, was added to the home. The Home for Incurable Children memorial cot was endowed by a mother in memory of her son.

A short address was given by Miss Lister, the teacher newly appointed by the board. Much appreciation was expressed by different speakers for the work of Miss Underhill and her staff for Miss Lister and for the comprehensive report of the secretary, Mrs. Donald.

tention of the gathering to the necessity for homes for the feeble-minded, and yet no provision for this class, the much attention is now being given to the subject. The number of defective children in nearly all institutions at present is large. For example, in the Protestant Orphan Home, twenty-five were pointed out as probably mentally defective, and in nearly every case on examination by Dr. MacMurchy the conclusion was found to be correct.

Controller McCarthy, said the speaker, had done great things in the matter, and the audience was advised to speak to all whom they might influence before Dec. 31.

Letters of regret from the mayor, Sir John Boyd and Rev. Mr. McNair, at inability to be present were read by Mr. Justice Osler, who presided.

SUFFS HOPING TO COMPEL ELECTION

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 7.—(Can. Press.)—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, when shown the London cable dispatch here today relating to the efforts being made to induce the British Government to come to an agreement with the suffragettes, said she was familiar with the question.

"I believe," said Mrs. Pankhurst, "the statement refers to a policy which has been formulated, not to be put into operation immediately, but to induce the Liberals and Unionists to declare themselves with regard to their intentions after the general election."

"With this policy the women of the Scottish League do not agree. We have been forced to the conclusion that the present leaders of the Liberal party are determined not to give women the right to vote."

To Force Election.
 "In the last ten days the chancellor of the exchequer has confirmed our opinion of the Liberal administration by a declaration that the present parliament would not be re-elected. Our policy, therefore, is to force a general election at the earliest possible moment and to secure a new parliament and a new administration."

"The recent action of the Unionist party in Ulster, where women have been declared eligible to elect and be elected to all offices in the provisional government satisfies me that the almost certain women will gain their enfranchisement from the Unionists. At any rate the militant suffragettes of Great Britain need not the political life of the so-called Liberal Government."

FEDERAL REVENUE FOR OCTOBER WAS LOWER

OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—(Can. Press.)—Details of the government financial statement show that Canada's revenue in the first seven months of the fiscal year totals \$101,103,314, which is about \$5,000,000 greater than in the same period of last year.

Consolidated account expenditure shows a slight increase to \$97,446,928 and about double that of the first seven months of the fiscal year, due principally to the \$12,000,000 of railway subsidies.

Revenue for October was \$12,225,338, about half a million under that of September, 1912. October expenditure aggregated a million and a quarter to \$8,749,537.
