The candidates with very few exceptions confined themselves to educational matters, and a slight discussion of the fact that most of the pupils in the schools were girls and that 80 per cent of the teachers were women.

**NO ONE WILL OPPOSE ALLAN IN HAMILTON** Mayor Re-elected by Acclamation—Little Interest Taken in Nominations.

HAMILTON, Dec. 23.—The municipal nominations here today furnished no surprises and passed off very quietly.

**Arthur Farmer** thought that the way to solve the transportation problem was to get just taxation, of whom four are to be elected; 14 are running for the city council, of whom 12 are to be elected, and 11 are running for the board of education, of whom seven will be elected.

**Wm. Hiltz** declared himself as being in favor of just taxation. He held that taxation was at the bottom of various civic problems.

**Wm. Hiltz** stated that he was opposed to the railway deal in its present phase. He thought that the railway property had been overestimated by the experts.

**Albert Hacker** was also against the deal as framed by the council.

**Robert McLeod**, in addition to being against the railway proposition thought the control of civic lines should be taken from the city hall and a commission appointed.

Ald. Ryding reviewed his work in council during the two years he has represented the ward. If elected he would try to have the sewer system completed during the year and would support Mayor Hocken in his work in the purchase of the railway.

John A. Macdonald is against the purchase because of the T.E.L. clause. He would lay all sewers before constructing permanent pavements.

Alexander Chisholm believes to be unfortunate that the street railway purchase should come up at election time.

F. Whetter was six years in old West Toronto Council. He did not take any determined stand on the issues under discussion.

Jesse G. Wright impressed the audience favorably. He is strongly in favor of the railway purchase and advocates a market-ward seven municipal ownership. He served four years in West Toronto Council.

James McGoldin claims to be a workingman's candidate. He lives and works in ward six and is not strongly in favor of the purchase.
