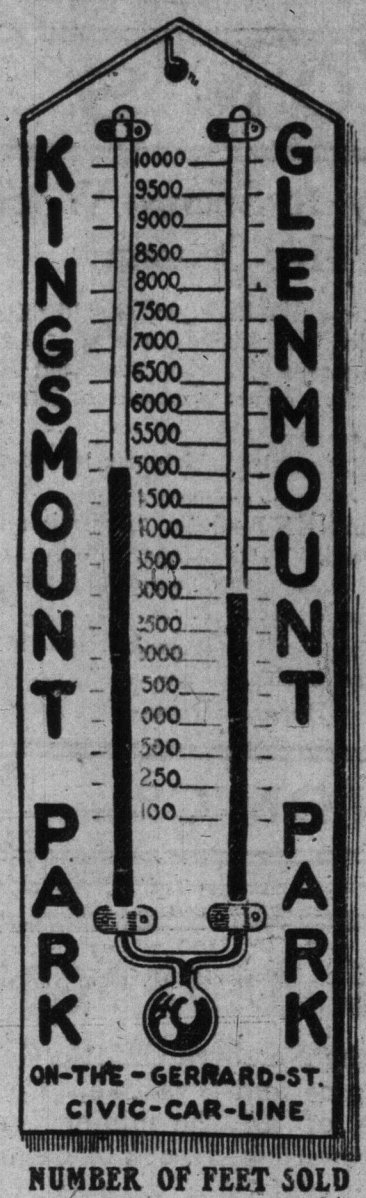

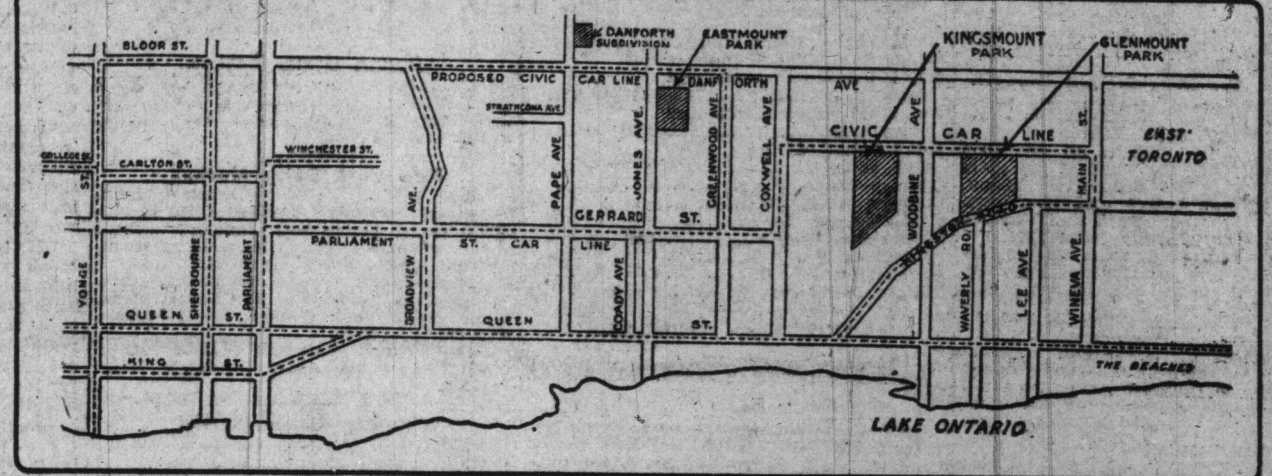

LEASIDE DEAL WILL EXTEND CITY LIMITS

The Canadian Northern May Effect a Compromise With Joseph Kilgour for Integral Part of Farm in Great Newer Rosedale Residential Scheme.

In regard to the Kilgour farm, which is wanted to complete the model residential section now being laid out by the Canadian Northern at Leaside, it may be of interest to give the facts in regard to that property.

Some four or five years ago Mr. Kilgour bought the old Burke farm of 175 acres for about \$20,000. He then bought 50 acres from John Muirhead, adjoining to the north, and 50 acres in line with it on Broadview-avenue, and also immediately north of the farm from Mrs. Beuharnais, for about \$300 an acre, making his total purchase price \$60,000. Mr. Kilgour can cash in for three-quarters of a million for the whole 300 acres, but he says he does not wish to sell, that he wishes to keep his farm as such. He has built a magnificent set of barns and especially a large brick arena for schooling of show horses in the valley of the Don, on the east side of the river, and it is now filled with fine horses under training. But Mr. Kilgour has his plans all ready for a new mansion on the west side of the Don, near Bayview-avenue. It is said that the plans will be held up for a few days, looking toward a readjustment by which he might dispose of a hundred acres on the west side of the Don River.

Were this done, it is evident that the new northern and eastern boundaries of the city will be the West Don River from York Mills down to the Forks near Thorncliffe farm gate, in the valley; and from there along the line of the Canadian Northern's eastern or Belleville line to the Scarborough and York townline. It is the natural boundary of the city and will take in all the high ground on this side of the river from York Mills to Mrs. Massey's farm gate on the Daves-road at the east end.

The Canadian Northern will have at least 1500 acres in their residential suburb and they will soon lay it out by a landscape engineer just as they have done in Montreal.

Farmers Leave in August.

All the Leaside farmers and others who have sold to the Canadian Northern syndicate are under agreement to give possession in August with the exception of the largest farm, that be-

longing to Joseph Lea, which does not change hands till September, but in the meantime the property will be surveyed and laid out. The plan will be something on the lines of the plan now being published in the newspapers in connection with the land sale at Montreal.

The real key to this new suburb of Greater Rosedale is a bridge across the belt line running right alongside of the Canadian Pacific viaduct from north-east Rosedale and up to the top of Bayview-avenue to Cummer Hill. This bridge will start from the rear of the new government house, and will give all Rosedale an entrance up on the high level, and make, as The World said once before, a newer and greater Rosedale above.

BELLEVILLE, April 7.—(Special).—A young man, George W. Rumble, of Trenton, on Saturday afternoon received fatal injuries by being struck by a G.T.R. freight train near Trenton. The victim died in the ambulance on the way to the hospital. An inquest will be held on Monday.

Rumble had made two trial trips on the G.T.R. as fireman. He was unmarried and his parents reside at Calgary.

RALLY AGAINST HOME RULE BILL

Belfast to Witness Demonstration of Orangemen To-morrow—Campaign Thruout United Kingdom.

LONDON, April 7.—(Can. Press).—Belfast is to have another great anti-home rule demonstration on Easter Tuesday, two days before the date set for the introduction of the home rule bill by the house of commons. This time there will be no necessity of moving troops into the city as was the case when Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, held his now historic meeting in the chief town of Ulster. An Irish member to make sure that Belfast would not again be put under practically what amounted to martial law, to enable a prominent politician to speak, asked the question in the house of commons the other day, "Will the government be prepared to introduce the bill in the house of commons?" The Irish secretary, who was then in the house, replied that the bill would be introduced in the house of commons, but that it would not be introduced in the house of commons.

The demonstration, in which 150,000 men will take part, will be held at the Royal Ulster Agricultural Society's grounds. Since the beginning of the year, meetings have been held all over the country to protest against home rule, and the meeting on April 9 will be a climax to the series. The men have been carefully drilled so that the parades and march pass shall pass off without any hitch. The main portion of the participants will be drawn from the Ulster Clubs of Ireland and the Loyal Orange Order.

The men from the shipyards of Belfast, 5000 in number, will also take part. At the head of the greatest of the shipbuilding concerns, Lord Pirie, a native of Quebec, is for home rule.

'Money Trust' Probe Will Start To-day

Relations of National Government to Banks Will Also Be Made Subject of Enquiry.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—(Can. Press).—The "Money Trust" investigation will begin Monday before a sub-committee of the banking and currency committee of the house. Frank Vanderlip, a New York banker, and Milton E. Allen, a Washington banker, both former officials of the treasury department, probably will be witnesses. Another who may be called is Leslie M. Shaw, now a Philadelphia banker.

The committee also will take up through the introduction of the Currency Murray bill, the relations of the national government to banks. The committee's office has been regulated by a mass of statistical data which will enable the committee to get a line on the interlocking directorates of the big financial and industrial institutions of the country.

NEW JUDICIAL DISTRICT

Timiskaming Will Be 20,000 Square Miles in Extent.

Twenty thousand square miles is the extent of the new judicial district of Timiskaming, which is being incorporated by the provincial government. The district will only be officially outlined as the result of the issuing of an order in council, and the territorial county seat of the district will also be decided on.

Blow to Cap. Bernier.
OTTAWA, April 7.—(Can. Press).—The government steamer Arctic will not go to the far north this year, to the disappointment of Captain J. E. Bernier. For some reason this year's sailing for the Arctic is not approved of by the government, and it is unknown if Bernier will visit his icy haunts again.

"Cheese King" Passes.
SMITH'S FALLS, Ont., April 7.—One of the best known and most highly respected residents of Smith's Falls passed away at his home on Friday morning in the person of Mr. M. K. Everett, known throughout the country as "the Ottawa Valley cheese king." He was in his eightieth year.
